THREE LOSE JOBS.

Heads of Oregon Naval Reserves Are Ousted.

PORTLAND, Ore., May 24. — Adjutant-General Finzer has issued a general order relieving George S. Shepherd, captain; John McNulty, commander, and John F. Blain, lieutenant-commander, of their duties as officers of the Oregon Naval Reserve. General Finzer's actions were dictated by the findings of the Court of Inquiry, appointed to delve into the jealousies and ill feeling among officers which resulted in a fight at the Armory on the night of April 1. The report of the Court of Inquiry severely censures all three of the officers who have been relieved of duty. The following paragraph gives an idea of its tenor: "We further find that there existed no unity of action among the officers of the Naval Reserve, no respect for authority, no discipline, no harmony of purpose and that said officers were divided into factions and their usefulness destroyed by dissensions, jealousies and strife."
