Meet Next Week.—The Marshfield city council will hold its next regular meeting a week, from tomorrow night, adjournment having been taken until the first Tuesday in June.

Sail Today.—The Excelsior will sail today for San Diego with a cargo from the Smith mill. The Ranger sailed this morning for Port Orford and the President sailed for Bandon.

Restaurants Merge.—The Palace and Melrose restaurants were consolidated today in the Palace. Messrs. Carlson and Kinney becoming associated with J. W. Tibbetts in the latter.
