ATTORNEY GENERAL WICKERSHAM IS CALLED ON CARPET TODAY

Required to Tell of His Past Relations With Big Corporations.

RECEIVE BIG FEE FROM TWO OF THEM

Explains Why Case Against Sugar Combine Was Settled Out of Court.

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 31.—Attorney General Wickersham appearing before the House Committee on Expenditures in the Department of Justice today testified he had "advised" the United States Steel Corporation on several occasions from 1901 to 1909, during his connection with the firm of Strong and Cadwallader and also that he had received his share of the fee turned into the firm for services to the American Sugar Refining Company.

The chairman sought particularly to learn of the Attorney General why the Department of Justice and the Treasury Department accepted \$2,000,000 in settlement from the American Sugar Refining Company as a restitution for undervaluations at the port of New York rather than enforce the severe penalty provided by law.
