The game was loosely played, both sides making a large number of errors. Marshfield started out well, and played good ball in every inning, except the seventh, when the boys went up in the air and allowed five runs to cross the plate. Johnson pitched good ball for Marshfield altho' he was wild at times and passed a number of men. With men on bases he usually tightened up and put his men down in order. Hennessey caught a fine game, only one man being able to steal on him during the entire game. In the first inning he threw two men out at second and continued pegging the ball in the same fashion when anyone was brave enough to attempt a steal. Both teams played well in the outfield and made some good catches, but the infield work was ragged at times although the boys pulled off some fast double plays and showed some brilliant flashes.

Dewy, who pitched for North Bend, was a trifle weak but had he had good support, the score would not have been as large.

The attendance was not so large as had been hoped for. Mulloy and Briggs acted as umpires. Next Saturday the same teams will meet at North Bend for the final game of the season.
