AGED WOMAN FOUND DEAD; ABOUT \$4,000 IS MISSING

Mrs. Thomas McGovern of Cunningham Suddenly Succumbs.

NO TRACE OF VIOLENCE IS FOUND ON BODY

Only Intimation of Foul Play Is Strange Disappearance of Money.

Mrs. Thomas McGovern, aged 67, was found dead at their home on the Powers' ranch, four and one-half miles up Cunningham Creek from the Coquille the night before last.

Coupled with her death is the mysterious disappearance of a large amount of money—the savings of herself and husband during their life time.

Tuesday morning, she was up and got breakfast for herself and husband. Then Mr. McGovern left for the Powers' ranch where he was employed.

However, as soon as he recovered from the shock, Mr. McGovern noticed that the trunk where she kept the money was open, the key still remaining in the lock and the money was gone.

The McGovern home is about a half mile from Camp No. 1 of the Smith-Powers company and about the same distance from the Powers' ranch and is in a rather isolated spot.

He summoned aid as soon as he was notified and arrangements made for the inquest.

The old couple lived alone. They have three children, two sons whose present whereabouts are unknown, and a daughter living in or near Hoquiam, Wash.

Mr. McGovern says that he often urged his wife to put the money in a bank but she was afraid of it and insisted on keeping it at home.

Mrs. McGovern had been suffering from heart trouble. Whether someone could have appeared to rob her and the fright caused a fatal attack of heart disease is speculation.

The body will be brought to Marshfield for burial, Rev. Father J. A. Moran conducting the services.

STEEL TRUST HEAD IS ON STAND

E. H. Gary Denies Knowledge of World Wide Combine — Clash of Committee and Government Bureau.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 1.—Elbert H. Gary, chairman of the Board of Directors of the United States Steel Corporation today flatly denied any knowledge of the proposed formation of a combination to control the steel made in the world.

Committee investigating the steel trust and declared he had come to Washington to tell all he knew of the big corporation. The examination of Gary brought out the fact that the Department of Commerce and Labor and its bureau of corporations are not cooperating with the Stanley committee which is conducting the investigation.

Terrific Explosion Occurs at Fortress La Toma at Managua.

STRICT CENSORSHIP KEEPS DETAILS SECRET

Washington Authorities Think Disaster Was Due to Carelessness.

SAN JUAN DEL SUR, Nic., June 1.—The fortress on Tiscapa Hill, was blown up at 3 p. m. yesterday. One hundred and fifty soldiers perished in the explosion. All the ammunitions in the fortress was destroyed.

DUE TO CARELESSNESS. United States Minister Sends Meager Details of Affair.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 1.—One hundred and fifty people were killed in an explosion of fortress La Toma at Managua, Nic., according to a telegram to the State Department today from Minister Northcott.

Northcott's dispatch indicated every person in the garrison was killed. Since the resignation of President Estrada and the assumption of power by Vice-President Diaz, the State Department has received no advices indicating discontent in the republic.

TOLD TO WASH HANDS; KILLS

Chicago Bartender Slays Man Who Told to Wash Before Waiting On Him.

CHICAGO, Ill., June 1.—Following the demand made upon him by Andrew Plovanok to "wash your hands before you wait on me," Emmanuel Over, a bartender, is alleged to have knocked down Plovanok. Later Plovanok died in a hospital from a fractured skull.

DISPUTE IN CONGRESS. Bryan Stirs Up Lively Row Over Wool Schedule.
