Haley, a former member of the Ma.garet Hes Company from until recently employed in Morris Bros, Logging Camp, 15 miles from Myrtle Point, committed suicide in a room at the Roseburg hotel early this morning by shooting himself in the head with a revolver. He was to have left for Portland tonight in company with Mrs. C. E. Morris, wife of one of the logging camp operlittle children a week ago because Morris abused her, so she said at the coroner's inquest. Haley came to Roseburg yesterday and the woman the day before. Haley and she occupied adjoining rooms. She told the coroner's jury that Haley "sat" in her room till 12:30 last, night chatting with her and then retfred to his own room, where the suicide occarred five hours later. The woman insisted their relations were platonic. but during her testimony it cropped out that they addressed each other as "Kid".
