Roseburg Man Escapes Jail Sentence by Close Margin.

ROSEBURG, Ore., June 1. — Max Weiss, convicted in the Circuit Court here last week for violating the prohibition law, was sentenced by Judge Coke to pay the maximum fine of \$500, the same as those imposed on two other beer sellers in the preceding trial. Like others, Weiss escaped a jail sentence only because the grand jury declared the jail unsanitary. Six other indicted soft drink dealers will be tried at the adjourned term of court next month.

Many Blackberries.—Jas Watt says that the indications are that the wild blackberry crop this year will be the largest in a long time. In a trip through the woods yesterday he found many patches of berries.

Has Typhoid.—Mabel Leaton, the fifteen-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Leaton of Eastside is ill of typhoid. This is the third member of the family to suffer from the disease, two brothers just recovering from it.

Starts Mining.—J. H. Macartney of the California Gold Recovery company is arranging to resume mining on "Whiskey Run" near Bandon, which years ago yielded heavily. He is putting in considerable equipment and expects to realize considerable on it.

Low Tides.—One of the lowest tides of the year this forenoon caused some bother to boats in the Bay. The Ferry Transit stuck on the mud near the east side of the channel for quite awhile and remained stranded with the passengers until the rising tide floated her.

Fractures Ankle.—Miss Catherine, the eldest daughter of H. E. Bessey of the Coos Bay Creamery, fell over a fence and fractured a bone in her left ankle yesterday. Dr. McCormac, who reduced the fracture, does not anticipate any lasting ill-effects from the injury.
