### TO CUT TIES HERE.

Says Local Timber Would Make Excellent Railway Material.

Mr. Culver of Los Angeles, who is here on a project for starting the Courtney mill, is figuring on making railroad ties one of the leading products of the mill. He says that the local timber is excellent for ties. The Santa Fe Railway has decided to get all its ties from the Pacific Northwest henceforth. A recent issue of the Los Angeles Examiner says: "Twenty vessels bearing 1,500,000 railroad ties are due in San Pedro within a few days. Fifteen of these vessels will bear 1,000,000 ties from the Hawaiian Islands and Java and five will bring the remainder from Washington and Oregon. The Santa Fe will use 1,000,000 of the ties in California and Arizona and 500,000 will be used by the Salt Lake route between Los Angeles and Salt Lake City. All the ties will be laid before September 1."
