RULE OF REASON.

PROFOUND as has been the impression left by the United States Supreme Court in the grave affirmation of the "rule of reason" as applied to the legal treatment of the trust-question and readily as the country has accepted the new definition and application of the principle, there are other important phases of life and conditions which are urging the predicate upon the people and forcing the adoption of some tremendous amendatory processes of thought and action in the mitigation of the social, commercial and financial extravagances that mark the times and point the way to ultimate decadence.

The intervention of this extraordinary standard at the highest point of our national establishment fastens it indelibly upon the mind of all who give thought to such things and from which they realize the inevitable and advantageous changes that must ensue in comity, commerce and universal inter-action. Taken in the abstract, as applicable to the incredible varieties of human engagement and courses of action, the rule is one of splendid and sensible government, and the farther it shall be carried the better for whoever shall adhere to it, court, or citizen, company, combine or custodian; its use will be provocative of that "age of reason" for which mankind has longed these millions of years.

Even here on Coos Bay the precept may find profuse and profitable ex-

ploration; there are hundreds of people and myriads of matters that may be brought within the compass of its play and turned from the inert and unpromising, to the alert and assuring "in the twinkle of an eye"; therefore are we hoping the persuasive, and pervasive, idea may lodge right here and begin its career of sensible simplicity, building rapidly to the grateful demonstration that reason is the running-mate of justice, that justice placates the hardest of conditions and makes for the peace and profit of all mankind. "The rule of reason", as a practicality, sounds too good; it has an ephemeral tang to it; but we believe it is susceptible of usage, growth and adaptation, and we yearn for its general and blessed tryout.

RUSH SURVEY OF THE HARBOR

Adverse Weather Conditions Delay Work Slightly—Crew at Work.

Work on the new survey of the harbor which is being carried on under the direction of Engineer F. E. Lee, is proceeding rapidly considering the adverse weather conditions with which the surveying crew has been confronted since starting the work. In order to avoid the high wind which has retarded the work at times, it has been decided to have the men start out earlier in the morning than they have in the past.

The stretch to be surveyed extends from the C. A. Smith Mill to Pony Inlet. Providing that no severe weather conditions are encountered, Mr. Lee predicts that the work of surveying the strip of water will be completed in record time.

The crew is composed at present of L. C. T. Balz and J. H. Polhemus, Jr., instrument men; E. H. Fidler, recorder; Neil Cornwall, leadman, and two boatmen who are used from time to time.
