C., June 6.—The action of the War Department in not reporting to Congress the awards of contracts for materials used in the construction of the Panama canal, amounting already to many millions of dollars, was the subject of inquiry today by the House Committee on Expenditures in that department.

The Coos Bay Paving company was given permission to temporarily use a part of Date street in North Marshfield for warehouse and storage purposes.

The recorder was instructed to notify Mrs. Murphy that the remains of the house on South Second street, which was burned a couple of years ago, be removed. It is an eye-sore to adjoining property owners and a menace to children playing around it. Capt. Alex Hall asked that the ferry slip be dredged out and that a leaky pontoon be repaired. The water front committee was instructed to look after it.

A rebate was ordered paid W. J. Escott for a sidewalk he constructed on Flanagan avenue.

Bids were ordered asked for cleaning the streets for six months from July 1 and for sprinkling the streets for three months.

The following amounts were ordered paid contractors: On North Second street, \$111.02; on Elrod, \$200; on storm sewers, \$23; on West Marshfield sewer, \$80.

VETOES MINE BILL

Colorado Chief Executive at Request of Union Vetoes Bill.

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)

DENVER, Colo., June 6.—The coal mine inspection bill passed by the recent legislature intended to prevent coal mine accidents, was vetoed by Governor Shafroth by request of the Miners' Union. The chief objection was occasioned by the Senate amendment requiring coal miners to pay cost of "shot firing" estimated this would have taken \$168,000 yearly from the wages of the miners.
