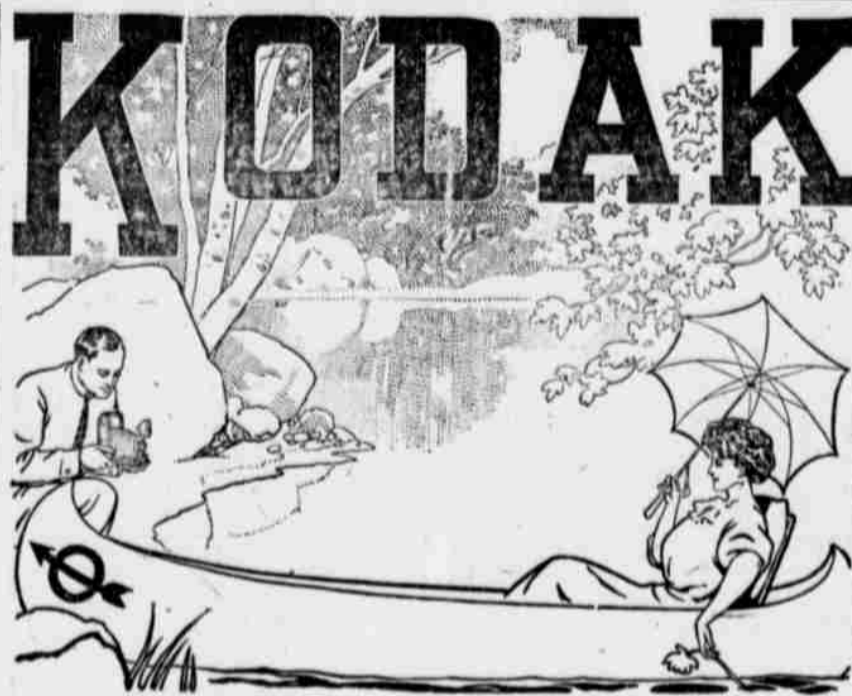
Miss Fannie George, instructor in music in the Marshfield schools the past year, and her sister will leave next week for Roseburg where they will visit for a while before going
