NEW PHONE LINES. The Coquille Valley Telephone Company have a force of men at work on their lines up the South Fork. An entire new line is being run to take care of new phones, and handle some of the phones from the 35 and 36 lines which were carrying too heavy a load for good service. Last Thursday the Coos Bay Home Telephone Co's crew finished 8 miles of new line up the South Fork. It is a 6-pin cross arm line of five circuit capacity. The line will be extended to Eckley and other points by the Coos County Fire Patrol, who have material on the ground already.—Myrtle Point Enterprise.

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Richmond Alert to Benefits of Fair. (From San Francisco Examiner.) The first application for exhibit space at the Panama-Pacific Exposition has been made. The city of Richmond has asked for room in which to make a big industrial display. The enthusiasm with which the application is made and the details of the projected exhibit set for are looked upon as an example of the vim with which California communities generally will enter into the creation of display. In its application, filed with the exposition company yesterday, Richmond calls attention to its wonderful growth and modestly says it will be the second city across the bay by 1915. It calls attention to its varied factories and the new ones that will establish there, and says that with these and the aid of the immense capital invested it will be enabled to create a notable display. The plan of having agents at the fair to take Eastern manufacturers to Richmond is announced. "As the great oil fuel depot of the West," the people of Richmond say, "where all the ships that sweep through the canal will fill their fuel tanks, it is particularly appropriate that our city should assemble a display of the first class."
