## KEPT METHODS WELL GUARDED

### Havemeyer Held Control of Sugar Refining Co., Through a Big Bluff.

(By Associated Press to the Coos Bay Times.)

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 12.—So carefully guarded were the operations of American Sugar Refining Company up to less than two years ago, E. F. Atkins, vice president and acting head of the corporation told the house "sugar trust" investigating committee today that stockholders were accorded no information as to how the company was being conducted. The condition grew so onerous, the witness said, that the New England stockholders combined and obtained control. When they did so in 1910, they discovered to their astonishment that H. O. Havemeyer, president and genius of the organization had maintained his supremacy with only 2,000 shares of stock holdings. Havemeyer at the time of his death, Atkins said, was valued about \$2,000,000 of the total of \$90,000,000 in the American Sugar Refining Company. "It had been generally supposed that Mr. Havemeyer owned a greater part of the stock," said the witness.

## RIEF WAS IN NORTH BEND

### Stayed at Hotel Oregon on Arrival From Portland on the Breakwater.

George Rief, seventy-seven years of age, who left his home at 712 South Ninth street, Tacoma, Wash., on May 21, and has not been heard from since by his relatives, it became known today was at the Hotel Oregon at North Bend, registering there on May 27. Rief left on the following day for Marshfield, according to a statement he made to S. Regstad, proprietor of the hotel. Upon reading of the strange disappearance of Rief in The Times last Friday, Regstad at once apprised Marshal Carter of the fact that Rief had stopped at the hotel.

Arriving at North Bend from Portland on the Breakwater, Rief engaged a room at the Oregon hotel. Mr. Rogstad was at once attracted to the attention of the man because of his old age, and when Rief came up to the desk to register, Rogstad remarked that it seemed strange for a man of his years to be traveling alone, and inquired of Rief whether he had any relatives in Marshfield. From the response made by Rief, Rogstad gained idea that Rief had left home on account of domestic troubles.

Rief appeared to be exceedingly seasick from the trip down the coast from Portland, and it was with difficulty that he reached his room.

Acting upon the information obtained from Rogstad, Marshal Jack Carter today instituted a vigorous search here for the aged man.

As Rief impressed persons at the Oregon as being well supplied with funds, it is possible that he passed through here without stopping over and went down to Coquille or Bandon, and from there probably engaged passage for San Francisco.

## EUREKA FINDS BIG TREASURE

Vessel Formerly Running Here With Capt. Burtis Makes Rich Haul.

The following San Diego dispatch will be of interest to many on Coos Bay, the Eureka having formerly run in here and Capt. Burtis, now in command of her, having been master of the M. F. Plant on the San Francisco-Coos Bay run up to a year ago:

"A message received here from a party of treasure-seekers aboard the steamer Eureka says their expedition to recover an immense cache of gold, hidden by the crew of a Chilean cruiser off the Honduras coast more than 20 years ago, has been successful. The treasure has been variously estimated at from \$15,000,000 to \$65,000,000, according to reports circulated here of the Eureka quest. The steamer is now headed for this port.

"The Eureka is in command of Captain Burtis and was taken on a 20-days charter by a party of San Francisco people about two weeks ago. The expedition is said to have been financed by Harry Krelling, a well-known clubman of San Francisco. The map showing the location of the buried treasure is said to have been in the possession of a former resident of Honduras, who succeeded in interesting Krelling in his story of the buried gold. The result was the chartering of the Eureka. The fact that most of the South American republics will not allow the exportation of gold, made it necessary to guard the plans of the expedition.

"The message received from Sallina Cruz reads: "Expedition a success in every way. Reach San Diego for oil next week."
