SENATORS ON DIRECT VOTE

Election Reforms Sought by People Discussed at Washington.

WASHINGTON June 13 Within half an hour after the beginning of today's session, the Senate entered consideration of the proposed constitutional amendment providing for the election of United senators by a direct vote of the people on which there had been an agreement to vote before the end of the session. It was understood there will be an extended discussion of the resolution before vote will be reached. While supporting the general proposition of election of senators by direct vote in a speech today, McCumber of North Dakota contended its enactment to the law would not prove panacea all ills of the flesh. He predicted that the man who thinks it is such will awake to the fact that in escaping the evils of the legislative corruption he has entered into a field of equally insidious danger and broader opportunities for the corruptionist. "That which has sometimes been brought into use to convert the individual legislator under the present system," said he, "will be used to convert the public under the new system, not so much by direct dealing with the public as by controlling and getting to the source of the public. MANIAC GIVES CREW BATTLE

To prevent any further trouble the demented man was lashed to the mast. While the Gualala stopped at Eureka enroute from Portland to San Francisco, the man stowed away on the steamer, and his presence was not known until he had lost his reason. The man showed battle, and had to be dealt with harshly, and was finally subdued, and lashed to the mast. At San Francisco, officers awaited the arrival of the steamer, and conveyed Long to the detention hospital.

J. CLEARY IS FINED \$5.00

Strikes G. Roberts, a Logger, Who He Claims Wanted to Beat Him Up.

Charged with striking Charles Roberts, a logger, while the latter was in a condition of intoxication, G. J. Cleary was fined \$5 by Recorder Butler this morning, and was also obliged to pay \$3 for costs incurred in summoning witnesses. Roberts was staggering along Front street last evening about 8 o'clock when he accosted Cleary. Cleary claims that Roberts threatened to beat him up, and called him vile names, whereupon he squared off and struck Roberts a stunning blow on the point of the jaw. Roberts reeled about from the force of the punch, and fell to the pavement, bleeding from his head and face. Cleary was arrested by Marshal Carter, who conveyed him to the jail, where he was locked up, but was released upon securing bail money from friends.

When brought into court this morning, Roberts was still under the influence of liquor, and was not able to tell a coherent story of what had occurred last night. The court, however, took the view that Cleary had no right to strike Roberts, and levied the fine and costs.

RIEF RETURNS TO PORTLAND

Mysterious Disappearance of George Rief of Tacoma Is Solved.

George Rief of Tacoma, Wash., whose relatives were alarmed over his whereabouts because of his advanced old age of seventy-seven years, and who communicated with Marshal Jack Carter asking the local officer to find Rief, it was learned today had taken passage on the Breakwater to Portland on June 2, as a steerage passenger. He is presumed to be on his way back to his home in Tacoma. Because of domestic troubles at home, Rief left Tacoma and went to Portland and from that city engaged passage on the Breakwater for this city. He arrived at North Bend on May 27, and registered at the Oregon Hotel. The first information of Rief's whereabouts in this vicinity was obtained from S. Rogstad, manager and proprietor of the Oregon Hotel. After leaving the Hotel Oregon on May 28, nothing more was heard or seen of Rief until he purchased a ticket for passage on the Breakwater to Portland.

C., June 13.—A subpoena for Secretary of State Knox to appear and explain the payment to Frederick Hale, son of former Senator Hale, of \$5,000 from the Canadian boundary fund of the State Department was issued today by the House Committee on Expenditures in the state department. The money was said to have been paid on the sole authority of Secretary Knox's O. K. on a piece of paper attached to an unsigned voucher.

COMMITTEE WILL REPORT TONIGHT

Balance of \$1,500 Fund Will Be Easily Raised, It Is Expected.
