FLAG DAY.

TODAY, June 14, 1911, is the 134th anniversary of the adoption of the stars and stripes as the flag of our country. The public recognition of Flag Day as a national anniversary, is each year becoming more general and genuine.

On the 14th day of June, 1777, Congress enacted: "That the Flag of the thirteen United States be thirteen stripes, alternate red and white; that the Union be thirteen stars, white in a blue field, representing a new constellation." The number of the stripes having been increased by the admission of new states, the possibilities of the nation's future development dawned upon our fathers, the original thirteen stripes were unchangeably restored by act of Congress on April 4, 1818, when it was enacted: "That from and after the fourth day of July next, the Flag of the United States be thirteen horizontal stripes, alternate red and white; that the Union be twenty stars, white, in a blue field, and that on the admission of a new State into the Union, one star be added to the Union of the Flag; and such addition take effect on the fourth day of July next, succeeding such admission."

Since the struggle of 1861-1865, the Flag has become the symbol of a mighty nation. It has been carried to the utmost parts of the earth, carrying liberty wherever it has been thrown to the breeze.

The stars and stripes, within the recent past, have come to possess new beauty for friendly eyes and new terror for the foes of liberty.

DIVORCE CASE HARD FOUGHT

Wife Resists Efforts of J. E. Bering For Severance of Marital Ties.

COQUILLE, Ore., June 14. — The divorce case of J. E. Bering, who is seeking a severance of his marital ties, has been occupying the attention of the circuit court for the past two days. The case is being hard fought, Mrs. Bering resisting the husband's application.

Mr. Bering now resides at Marshfield, having moved there from San Francisco. Mrs. Bering and two daughters, aged about twenty-six and twenty-one and their youngest son aged about seventeen, came up from San Francisco to fight the case, the children siding in with the mother.

Mr. Bering alleges gross and habitual use of liquor and incompatibility by his wife while she denies the charges and infers that "another woman" has prompted him to begin the suit. The evidence in the case was decidedly salacious.

Bering was formerly a music teacher but lost most of his property in the San Francisco disaster.

Tom Bennett and Bennett Swanton represented Mr. Bering while C. B. Selby and C. F. McKnight represented the wife.
