WILL ENFORCE LIQUOR LAWS

City Council Takes Steps to and Reported Violations— Other Business.

At a meeting of the Marshfield city council last night, Marshal Carter was given instructions to take every precaution possible to prevent further violations of the liquor ordinance and liquor laws. Several members of the council stated that it had been reported to them that there were a number of flagrant violations of the law on Sunday, many bottles of booze being disposed of to loggers.

Marshal Carter said that he was at the ball game in the afternoon and did not have an opportunity to keep a close watch but that in the future he would. Some of the members of the council intimated that a plain clothes man should be secured to run down the alleged "bootleggers."

In connection with this, inquiry was made of City Attorney Goss if the council could refuse to grant a license to any saloonkeeper simply on general knowledge of violations of the liquor ordinance and without preferring charges. Mr. Goss said that he thought they could, other state supreme courts having so ruled although the point has never been passed on by the Oregon Supreme Court. He said he understood that some of the liquor dealers were anticipating such a move on the part of the council and preparing to fight it. He said it might be expensive to the city. This suggestion led some of the councilmen to remark that the city was just as able to fight it as the saloon men and that if any one was preparing for a fight, they could get it.

The reason for bringing it up was that the saloon licenses are to be renewed June 30 and City Attorney Goss will be away, having obtained a month's leave of absence.

Other Business.

The Fourth street sewer matter was left over until the next meeting. Dr. Harriman not having been heard from. All other property owners except Mrs. Minnie Tower has agreed to pay their part of the cost and have the improvement made by private contract. Mrs. Tower is expected to agree to it also.

An ordinance regulating the storage of gasoline, kerosene, etc., was read. It is a copy of the Seattle ordinance but some of the councilmen thought it was too rigid and it was referred back to the city attorney, fire and water committee and Chief Traver for changes.

The new fire engine was ordered accepted and the first payment of \$2,165 made and arrangements made to pay the other \$4,000 in one year and two years. Chief Traver reported that had been found entirely satisfactory.

The remodeling of the fire-engine house to accommodate the new engine was referred back to the fire and water committee and Chief Traver to investigate further.

D. A. Curry's petition signed by 357 people asking that the building ordinance be amended so that improvements costing less than \$100 can be made without securing a building permit was read. The petition is for the district outside the fire belts. Owing to the small number of councilmen present, nothing could be done last night but City Attorney Goss was instructed to prepare an amendment so that the council can take the matter up at its next meeting.

Dr. Dix and Mr. Sleep were ordered rebated the cost of their side-walks on Flanagan avenue, they having put them in by private contract. Mayor Straw and Councilman Sav-

are in Portland and consequently were not present last night.

The council will hold its next regular meeting Friday night, June 30, to take applications for saloon licenses and also to open bids for street cleaning and street sprinkling for the next six months.

The Market avenue improvement was not brought up last night, owing to a lack of sufficient councilmen to do anything about it.

Wires That Portlanders Will Fly Here July Fourth For \$3,500.

Tom Bennett this morning received the following self-explanatory telegram from his father, J. W. Bennett, who is now in Portland:

"H. W. Manning of 2329 Oak street, Portland, Ore., has a Curtiss-Farman aeroplane and contract with Aviator Walsh. He has made thirty-five flights here and is still alive. Will send machine, four men and Walsh to Marshfield to make three flights Sunday, Monday, Tuesday and pay his own expenses for \$3,500. Can arise and alight at race track. He furnishes cuts and newspaper write-ups for your advertisement free to you, you paying for the printing and advertising. He says it is customary to charge one dollar admission, and grand stand one dollar and fifty cents which the committee keeps to pay the above amount and surplus if any. You could also charge extra for vehicles and concession. Communicate by night letter as other places want him for the fourth.
