

The Fourth street sewer matter was left over until the next meeting, Dr. Harriman not having been heard from. All other property owners except Mrs. Minnie Tower has agreed to pay their part of the cost and have the improvement made by private contract. Mrs. Tower is expected to agree to it also.

An ordinance regulating the storage of misoline, kerosene, etc., was read. It is a copy of the Seattle ord!nance but some of the councilmen thought it was too rigid and it was referred back to the city attorney fire and water committee and Chief Traver for changes.

The new fire engine was ordered accepted and the first payment of \$2,165 made and arrangements made to pay the other \$4,000 in one year and two years. Chief Traver reported that had been found entirely satisfactory.

The remodelling of the fire-engine house to accommodate the new eu gine was referred back to the five and water committee and Chief Traver to investigate further.
