THE Canadian government has received approval from the imperial government for a \$5 and \$10 gold coin to be exactly equivalent to the American coins of the same denomination.

It is announced at Ottawa that an agreement has been reached with the United States for complete reciprocity in the gold coinage of the two countries, the coins of each to be received at face value by the other.

This is another link welded that binds the two countries together commercially.

Some of us on Coos Bay would like to see them make the same arrangement about the smaller silver coins. It jars one to find that a Canadian 50 cent piece that you have accepted in good faith for half a dollar will not be accepted at the bank unless it is discounted 20 per cent making it worth only 40 cents.

RAILWAY HOPE RUNNING HIGH

the right-of-way, where ground had been broken for a considerable distance, in addition to the hundreds who came in buggies, wagons, on bicycles and on foot. No more interested or enthusiastic gathering of Eugene people has been seen recently than the one that witnessed the beginning of actual construction on the long-awaited Siuslaw railroad yesterday afternoon.

Promptly at 2 o'clock, the parade formed at the corner of Eighth and Willamette street, and headed by the Y. M. C. A. band and the mayor and city council, proceeded out West Eighth street to the western terminus of the right-of-way. Very nearly 60 automobiles were in the line of parade, and these were followed by buggies, carriages, bicycles and every sort of conveyance for getting there.

The crowd that turned out was a striking evidence of the very deep personal interest that projected railroads have for all classes of people. Arrived at the right-of-way, where the contractor's force of men and teams was already busy breaking the ground, a formal program of speeches was heard.

Hon. J. M. Shelley spoke of the ultimate beneficial result that has attended the building of every railroad line in Oregon, pointing out that while some of them have failed to pay dividends on the stock with which they were floated, they have later been taken over and merged into larger systems, with great resulting benefit to the community which they served.

Senator W. W. Calkins spoke of the great benefit resulting to cities from traffic facilities, and predicted for Eugene hundreds of thousands. He said that no city in the West was better fitted by natural advantages to become a city of the second class than Eugene. Drawing an analogy to the event that was being celebrated, he told how the city of Minneapolis had built a railroad connecting with water transportation, and thus maintained a freight rate—despite the great trunk lines of railroad—that made possible the continuance of her great milling industry, and prevented its being shifted by means of unfavorable freight rates to Duluth.

M. J. Duryea, president of the Eugene Commercial club, spoke in felicitation of the enterprise, and bespoke for it the help of the citizens of Eugene. Hon. S. H. Friendly, citing the case in hand, stated that the future of Eugene was merely what the men of Eugene made it—that the advance of cities was entirely dependent upon the spirit of the citizenship. W. A. Bell, J. D. Matlock and A. F. Campbell made addresses that were received with enthusiasm.

Contracts have been let as far as Elmira, and a permanent camp has been established at the Conger place west of the city. A good showing has been made in the work of actual construction.
