SENATOR WARREN IN BITTER ATTACK ON THE WOOL TARIFF

Asserts Report Filed by Ways and Means Committee Is Far From the Facts.

SPEECH IS FILLED WITH WORDS OF DEEP SATIRE

Longworth Makes Plea For Revision of Schedules, and Denounces Democratic Bill.

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 16.—A preliminary attack on the democratic wool revision bill was made in the Senate today when Senator Warren of Wyoming characterized the report made by the House Committee on Ways and Means as "more recent and more ably edited than the dictionary, and with more able men interested in it."

Warren replied the definitions of "wethers" on the wool, and other items of sheep raising industry tended to show that the report was wide of the facts.

"It is because the senators 'wether' is being shorn that the showing is one of anxiety," asked Senator Reed of Missouri.

"No," said Warren, "it is because if the facts and definitions here are correct, all sheep raisers have been groping in the dark since the industry began."

Nicholas Longworth, in the House today made a plea for a scientific revision of the tariff schedules, and denounced the democratic wool tariff revision bill as founded on vague rumors or total ignorance.

REJECTED MAN KILLS WOMAN

Because of Refusal to Elope John Omega Ends Life of Mrs. De Gruccia.

TWO ARE DEAD IN GUNFIGHT

Duel Between Two Men Results In Two Being Killed and Another Near Death.

OMAHA, Neb., June 16.—Tony Banderi and Florence Brooks are dead and Frank Banderi, a cousin of the dead man is probably fatally wounded as the result of a quarrel between the two men in the woman's home here today. Frank Banderi, although too weak to give details of the affair told the police that his cousin did all the shooting. Each man held a partially emptied revolver. They lived together and the woman kept house for them until recently.

WILL CASE IS HARD FOUGHT

Judge Hall Takes Gant Controversy Under Advisement—First One In County

COQUILLE, Ore., June 16.—The Gant will case hearing was completed by Judge Hall after a nine days' session. Judge Hall took the case under advisement and will render a decision in the near future.

This is said to be the first will contest that has ever been tried in Coos county courts. Incidentally a great volume of evidence was introduced, it being estimated that it will cost \$700 for a transcript of the testimony if the case is finished as it is likely.

The case comes from Myrtle Point, Gant having willed an estate of about \$10,000 to his nephews at Myrtle Point. Now brothers of the deceased claim that he was of unsound mind when he made the will that cut them off or was unduly influenced by his nephews.

PIMPLE CAUSES DEATH.

Charles Fogarty Dies of Blood Poisoning Resulting From Finger Nail Infection.

FORT DODGE, Ia., June 15.—Charles Fogarty, who picked a pimple from his face with his finger nails about ten weeks ago, died in a hospital as the result. The infection from the man's finger nails caused blood poisoning.

TONS OF DYNAMITE TO BE USED

Over Ten Million Pounds of Dynamite to Be Used In Excavating of Canal in the Coming Year.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 16.—

The canal diggers on the isthmus expect to explode ten million pounds of dynamite during the next year in excavating work. The Canal Commission has just placed a contract for this vast quantity, the prices ranging from \$12.25 to \$13.12 a hundred pounds.

BIG JUMP IN PINE PRICES

State of Kansas Produces Proof That Price Lists Sent Up Price of Yellow Pine

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 16.—Joseph F. Smith, a head Mormon church, has been summoned to appear before the House Sugar Trust Investigation Committee to tell what he knows about the formation of Utah-Idaho Sugar Company, a combination. Senator Smoot of Utah made about an unsuccessful effort to have the Mormon president excused insisting that Thomas R. Culter of Salt Lake could supply all the information desired from Smith. The committee, after considering the matter, decided Smith should appear in person.

Many New Forests to Be Created by President by July 1st.

PLAN TO GET MORE EFFICIENT MANAGEMENT

Eleven New Districts Already Established In the Northwest.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 16.—A number of the larger national forests are being divided. This is being done to permit more efficient management. The divisions are to be set apart as separate forests. Several proclamations already have been signed by Taft, carrying out changes, and it is expected that by July 1, eleven new forests will have been created. These with the exception of a few additions, and eliminations will be established out of twenty existing forests, principally in Oregon, Idaho, Montana and Northern California. This new policy it said to be extended to all the large forests.
