# PLAN TO GET MORE EFFICIENT MANAGEMENT

## Eleven New Districts Already Established In the Northwest.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 16 .-A number of the larger national forests are being divided. This is being done to permit more efficient management. The divisions are to be set apart as separate forests. Several proclamations already have been signed by Taft, carrying out changes, and it expected that by July 1, eleven new forests will have been created. These with the exception of a few additions, and eliminations will be established out of twenty existing forests, principally in Oregon, daho, Montana and Northern California.
