FAST TIME TO PORTLAND.

Coos Bay and Roseburg Stage Line Affords Good Service.

The Coos Bay and Roseburg stage line is now affording excellent service to passengers. Parties can leave Marshfield in the morning, catch the evening train for Portland, arriving in the Rose City at 7:15 the next morning, the same as if they take the auto lines out of here. Besides this, the fare is only \$6 or \$11 for the round trip, about one half what the auto lines charge. In a week or so, Agent Schetter expects that the Coos Bay and Roseburg Stage Company will have gone service over the winter part of the route.

A new Concord Coach has been put to improve the stage service. It is a fine passenger and is one of the best riding vehicles obtaining. It is eliminating all the jolting that passengers dislike.

PLAN TO GO TO MEETING

Many From Coos County to Attend Church of Christ Convention.

A number of Coos Bay members of the Church of Christ are planning to attend the National Convention of that denomination which will be held in Portland July 4 to 12. Among those planning to go from here are Miss Mamie Isaacs, Mrs. H. W. Painter, Mrs. Charm Kinney, Judge C. A. Sehlbrede and Mrs. F. K. Gettins will also be in attendance, they being at Salem now. Coquille, Myrtle Point and Bridge will also have delegations in attendance.

In speaking of the meeting, C. A. Sehlbrede said: "The Annual National Convention will follow the State Convention of the Church for Oregon. Special trains to carry representatives to this great convention will be run from Cincinnati, Indianapolis, Louisville, St. Louis, Kansas City, and Chicago. It is figured that there will be at least Fifteen Thousand in attendance at this convention. It is not a delegate convention or assembly, but all members of the church are allowed seats and participation in its deliberations. The largest numbers will come from the middle west and south, but representatives from about all of the states in the Union will be there, as well as some from England, Scotland, Africa, Japan, China, India and the Islands.

"The general committee on arrangements appointed some months ago has been busy and have been doing everything to provide for the success of the convention, and the comfort and pleasure of the visitors. Among other arrangements which have been made looking to this end, is one looking to the advertising of Oregon, a committee consisting of one member from each county has been selected to provide exhibits from their respective county. An exhibit room will be provided where these exhibitions may be seen, and where literature will be found for distribution. Mrs. C. A. Sehlbrede of Coos Bay, has been selected to represent Coos County, on that committee. Some action should be taken by our people looking towards having something on exhibition from Coos County, in the exhibition room of the convention."

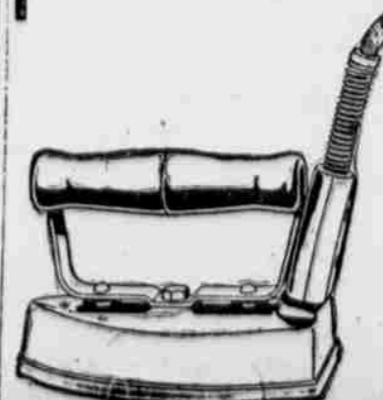
