The youth was arrested and lodged in the town jail at Thorndale where last night the mob gathered and stormed the prison. IDENTIFY BODY OF LOGGER

Thomas Douglas Was Name of Logger Killed on the Coquille River.

The logger who was instantly killed at Seeley & Anderson's Logging Camp on the lower Coquille river, was identified as that of Thomas Douglas, about forty-nine years of age. It is believed that Douglas has two sisters living somewhere in the state. No other particulars are known about the dead man.

Thomas met his death in a rather singular way. He was engaged in felling a big tree, when the tree started to fall, and striking another tree, its weight battered the other tree down. Thomas was struck by the falling tree, and was killed instantly.

The funeral was held in Bandon this afternoon at 2 o'clock.
