TO INSANE ASYLUM.

Survivor of Rogue River Pirates Declared Insane.

A San Francisco paper says: "United States Marshal C. T. Elliott will take George Washington Wise, the pirate, to Washington next week to be placed in Elizabeth hospital. Instructions came from the Attorney General yesterday ordering the removal. The trial of Wise, who was accused of the murder of Captain E. B. Wood of the steamship Buckhorn on the high seas, off the mouth of the Umpqua River, Oregon, was interrupted by the sudden insanity of the prisoner. Physicians appointed by Judge Van Fleet reported that Wise would probably be permanently insane. The trial was brought to an end and the Attorney General notified, 'French' West, who planned the looting of the vessel and who did the actual shooting, jumped into the sea and was lost."
