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TWO AND HALF BILLIONS FEET OF TIMBER IN TWO TOWNSHIPS

Remarkable Showing of Coos County's Wealth In Lumber Resources.

FIRST STATEMENT OF TIMBER CRUISER'S WORK

Detailed Statement Giving Facts and Figures of Standing Timber.

An indication of the great timber wealth of Coos county is found in the official figures of the standing timber in two townships made public now for the first time by Dennis McCarthy, official cruiser by appointment of the county court.

Mr. McCarthy's crew of cruisers recently completed the estimates in township 24 range 10 and the following are the official figures from his records of the timber therein:

The poor showing of section 6 is caused by the fact that nearly one-half was burned over.

Sometime since Mr. McCarthy cruised township 31 range 10 and found the timber therein to amount to 1,300,815,000 feet.

In addition to the detailed statement of the different timber, Mr. McCarthy's records as prepared for the county assessor show a topographical map of the township giving all the streams, slopes, ledges, cleared land, etc.

TRAVELS FROM MEXICO CITY

William Woolsey In Prairie Schooner Journeys From Old Mexico to Oregon.

Journeying nearly half way across the continent a train of three prairie schooners arrived in Marshfield this morning after encountering storms, rains, and all sorts of weather conditions.

One of the prairie schooners, the one driven by William Woolsey, not only traveled half way across the continent, but previous to setting out for the Oregon from Wyoming, had traversed the rough roads leading from the City of Mexico, a distance of thousands of miles.

Woolsey left Mexico City last May, more than a year ago, and in the face of all kinds of adverse weather drove his sturdy team of horses from the capital of Old Mexico to Northern Wyoming.

E. T. Boger and George Ace, the two other men each driving one of the canvas covered schooners, did not travel the distance as far as Woolsey.

During their long trip none of the men were in touch with current events. Woolsey, who had lived in Mexico City for many years, expressed much surprise to know that former President Diaz of Mexico has abdicated and fled to Spain and was not even aware that Mexico had gone through a trying revolution.

While the men have made no plans to what they will do in the future, they seemed to be impressed with Marshfield, and may settle here.

TWO NEW STATES ARE ADMITTED

Resolution Admitting Territories of Arizona and New Mexico as States Into Union Receives Favorable Action at Hands of Senate Committee.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 24.—The Senate Committee on Territories today voted six to three to report favorably on the House resolution admitting New Mexico and Arizona to statehood with the provision that the Arizona constitution concerning the judiciary recall shall be resubmitted to the people.

WIDEN SCOPE OF INQUIRY.

Counsel For Senator Lorimer Attack Statement of Clarence S. Funk (By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 24.—The scope of the Lorimer investigation was materially widened today when the Senate investigation committee decided to allow Lorimer's counsel to question motives which might have prompted any official of the International Harvester Company to oppose Lorimer's political advancement.

It seemed to be the purpose of Lorimer's counsel to indicate that the opposition of the Harvester Company to Lorimer would result in a movement to increase the taxes of the company from less than ten thousand to five hundred thousand dollars.

U. S. District Court Decides Merger of Southern Pacific and Union Pacific Is Legal

JUDGE HOOK FILES A DISSENTING OPINION

"Only Question Involved Was Union Pacific a Competing Line?" Says Court.

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)

ST. LOUIS, Mo., June 24.—The merger of the Southern Pacific and Union Pacific railroads is legal according to an opinion handed down today by the United States circuit court in the eighth district.

Judge Hook filed a dissenting opinion in which he expressed a belief that the government's petition was well founded and should have been granted.

The majority decision was written by Judge Elmer B. Adams and was mailed to the clerk of the court here. "The only question," read the opinion, "was whether the Union Pacific Company was a competing line prior to 1901 for transcontinental business with the Southern Pacific Company, whose line extended from New York on the east over the sea to New Orleans, thence by rail to San Francisco and Portland on the West."

The merger according to the court did not cause a change in the rates nor the complaints of discrimination, and conspiracy.

RAN A BLIND PIG; ARRESTED

Mrs. Fannie O'Donnell and her Daughter Arrested For Running a Blind Pig.

Charged with selling liquor without a license, and operating a blind pig, two women, Mrs. Fannie O'Donnell and her daughter, Miss L. C. Bahman of Bunker Hill, were arrested this morning by Constable W. B. Cox on information furnished by Deputy District Attorney Liljeqvist of Coquille.

When taken before Justice of the Peace Penneck this morning the two women were formally charged with the crime of selling liquor without a license.

Suspicion against the two women has existed for several weeks, and Deputy District Attorney Liljeqvist has visited Marshfield and Bunker Hill several times for purposes of gathering evidence.

Mrs. O'Donnell was formerly proprietor of the Breakwater Hotel retiring from business some time ago. The two women were released in bail of \$50 for both.
