## J. W. Bennett Tells Portlanders How They Can Reach God's Own Country.

Before leaving Portland J. W. Bennett sent a message to the people of Portland through the columns of the Journal, telling of Coos county's attractions and how to reach this section. He talked autos instead of railways and yesterday before departing for Ten Mile on a fishing trip he reiterated his statements to a Times reporter and said he had nothing to say for the present about railways. The following is the statement in the Journal:

"So much has been said in the papers as to what is going to be done in the matter of railroad building within the state of Oregon and so many of such prophecies are still unfulfilled that it is now about time," said J. W. Bennett of Coos Bay, "that we begin to talk about what has been done, and from that judge of the future."

"Coos Bay is not suffering at the present time for the want of passenger communication with the interior of the state. There are at present in operation four means of communication with the Southern Pacific, upon which automobiles are operated, and these will undoubtedly continue in active operation until the rainy season sets in and perhaps longer as the county court of Coos county is taking active steps to complete an all-winter road over the old Coos Bay wagon road to Roseburg."

"A line of automobiles is operated between Roseburg and Marshfield on Coos Bay, leaving Roseburg and Marshfield every morning at 6:30 a. m., reaching the opposite point of the route the same evening. The lines of these roads are traveled so that during the hot portion of the day the traveler is passing through the heavy timber where it is cool, whereas in the evening and in the morning they are in the valley or along the waters of Coos Bay, where it is pleasant and enjoyable. The river along the greater portion of this route abounds with trout and many people take advantage of the beauties of the locality to spend their vacations there."

"The proprietors of this route are the owners of two 1911 40 horse-power Buick machines and two 1910 30 horse power Chalmers Detroit machines."

"There is a new line of automobiles from Drain to Allegany on the headwaters of Coos River and from there they are taken down a distance of 20 miles to Marshfield by steamer. This route has just been established and passes through one of the most attractive and beautiful locations in the state of Oregon."

Then another automobile has been put on between Drain and Scottsburg, where the passenger is taken down the Umpqua on the river boat and from the mouth of the Umpqua by stage down the beach to Coos Bay. This is a most enjoyable trip in the summer time.

"Automobiles make numerous trips between Roseburg and Myrtle Point and from there to Marshfield. But whether or not a regular automobile line has been established on A. N.
