PUBLIC SCHOOLS AS SOCIAL CENTER FOR THE PEOPLE.

THE suggestion has been made that the board of education should make social centers of the Coos Bay schools and it sounds like a good idea.

The schools are the property of all the people. They represent an expensive investment on the part of the taxpayers. When they lie idle for three months in the year their owners receive no return on the investment.

This is poor policy. The grounds should be used for public playgrounds, and the buildings for public clubhouses. Lectures should be delivered there and moving pictures exhibited for the recreation and education of the people.

This policy has already been followed by several cities, some using the schools for some of these purposes and others for all. Good results for the welfare of the community have followed in every case.

LUMBER TRUST IN INDICTED

Charged With Violating the Anti-Trust Act Lumber Barons Must Stand Trial.

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)

CHICAGO, Ill., June 23.—The secretary's of fourteen lumber dealers associations was indicted today and charged with violation of the Sherman Act. Each indictment is in two counts. The first charges of conspiracy among the retail lumber dealers to interfere with and restrain the trade between the manufacturers and the wholesalers and consumers. The second conspiracy is to suppress and eliminate the competition that should exist between the wholesalers and the retailers and consumers.

The associations represented by the indicted men extends from Pennsylvania to the Pacific coast. The three secretaries of the organizations received immunity for testifying before the grand jury.

Among those indicted is A. L. Porter of Spokane, secretary of the Western Retail Lumbermen's Association.

ARIZ. AGAINST RECALL ACT

He based his request on the opposition of the President to this feature of the constitution, and said he feared its retention ultimately would defeat the fight for statehood.
