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REFUSED TO MILK COWS; YOUNG GIRL IS MURDERED

Step-mother and Her Brother Are on Trial For Crime.

GIRL GAGGED AND BOUND; LEFT TO DIE IN ATTIC

Alleged Murderers Admit Guilt But Deny Intent to Kill.

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)

OROVILLE, Cal., June 28.—Mrs. Emma Rumbil and her brother, Arthur Davis, who are in the Butte County jail charged with murdering the former's thirteen-year-old step-daughter Helen Rumbil by gagging and binding her fast in the sunny attic of their home near Griddly, continue to assert they had no intention of killing the girl.

The punishment which resulted in the girl's death was administered when she refused to milk the cows. Mrs. Rumbil persists that the girl committed suicide but the officers assert the evidence tends to show death was due to violence.

Prompt action by the authorities served to allay excitement.

REALTY VALUES ON COOS BAY

SUBSTANTIAL INCREASE IN LAND PRICES IN THIS FAVORED SECTION—SOME DEALS CLOSED—OTHERS UNDER CONSIDERATION.

The recent activity in real estate circles directs attention to the fact that while Coos Bay and the Coos Bay country has not been having a boom there has been a substantial increase in land values here in the past few years.

Without reference to the options recently taken and the many rumors in circulation the few transactions known to be consummated furnish an index to the advance in prices of land in a few years.

The Smith ranch at Flagstaff recently disposed of for \$23,000 was purchased by Smith for \$2,300. He has farmed the place and made money dairying and truck gardening every year since he has owned it.

The Louis De Fault ranch of ten acres sold for \$5,500 was purchased by DeFault a few years ago for \$1,000.

The Sacchi property has been greatly improved since Mr. Sacchi acquired it but he only paid \$775 for the lot that he sold the other day for \$20,000.

Negotiations that have been pending for some days for the purchase of the E. A. Anderson lots on Front street and Commercial avenue by G. S. Arnold, have been closed and payment has been made on the property which has been sold for \$18,500. The deal for the Coke lot on the corner of Commercial and Second street which was optioned at the same time has not been closed as yet.

Among the other rumors in circulation is one to the effect that F. M. Friedberg sold his Broadway property for \$13,000.

NO MONOPOLY OF WATER FRONT

Government Will Investigate Attempted Control of Alaska Bay.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 28.—As a sequel to the decision of the Interior Department cancelling the Cunningham Alaskan Coal and Land claims, Senator Poindexter of Washington yesterday introduced a resolution which was immediately passed calling upon the President for all available information as to the alleged effort of the Controller Bay Railroad Company to monopolize the water front of Controller Bay in Alaska. This bay is the natural outlet of the rich Bering river coal fields.

HAD FRIENDS ON COOS BAY

Dave Campbell, Late Chief of Portland Fire Department Known Here.

The late Dave Campbell, chief of the Portland fire department, news of whose tragic death appeared in The Times Monday evening, was in his youth a double in appearance of G. N. Bolt of this city. Along in 1884 Mr. Bolt was attending school in Portland and on more than one occasion he was halted on the streets and addressed as "Dave." They were personal friends at the time and this on several occasions added to the confusion.

J. N. Teal, the well-known Portland attorney, who was visiting in the city, was also a close personal friend of the dead fire chief, in fact Mr. Teal gave Campbell his first lesson in boxing and later Campbell was matched against the famous Jack Dempsey but was defeated. Subsequently he gave up the boxing game entirely.

Mr. Teal was greatly shocked and grieved at the tragic death of his old friend and just before boarding the Breakwater for home visited The Times office to see if any additional details of the chief's death had been sent out by the Associated Press.

This followed the reading by the officials of the announcement made by Clarence S. Darrow, Job Harriman, Joseph Scott and Lee Davis, attorneys for McNamara brothers, that they would not permit Mrs. McManigal to go to the grand jury room except by direct order of the court.

The prosecution is also alleged to have refused to allow the confessed conspirator to see his children despite his frequent requests.
