Fire Danger.—There wasn't a rancher in Coos County who welcomed the late rain with more pleasure than F. S. Dow. The reason for Mr. Dow's joy was that his ocean dock warehouse has recently been in danger of fire from sparks from steam vessels on the bay and he thinks the good soaking it received will lessen the danger until some of the vessel owners can place spark arresters on their vessel smokestacks. On one evening last week the ocean dock caught fire four times and it was only by great good fortune that a bad conflagration was averted.

Maj. Morrow Injured.—While on a New York Central train two weeks ago Major J. F. McIndoe, corps of engineers, U. S. A., nearly lost the sight of his left eye as the result of an object being hurled through the window of his coach by a passing train. The train was just above Albany at a point where the locomotives scoop water out of the tanks between the tracts, when a train bound in the opposite direction from that in which the train on which the major passed. As the engine went by it took water and there was a sudden crash as an object struck the window of the section occupied by Major McIndoe. It shattered the glass of two windows and one piece about an inch long struck the major just below the eye. He jumped to his feet and a woman in the section ahead extracted the piece of glass from the wound out of which the blood flowed freely. A physical culture teacher who was aboard the train succeeded in stopping the flow of blood somewhat until the train reached the next station where a doctor met it and dressed the major's wound. The major says that the resulting blackness around his eye was a source of great fun to his old classmates at the twentieth anniversary of the graduation of the class held at West Point on June 12. —Portland Journal.

The processing of ripe olives is largely a question of individuality. In a general way all olive pickers use the same formula but there is a wide difference in results. For fifteen years, Miss Ehmann has been studying experimenting, developing a method entirely her own which begins with the picking of the olives from the trees and ends with the sorting of the olives by hand before they are packed in air tight tins or bottles.
