Olive Freda Ehmann, Grower

The processing of ripe olives is largely a question of individuality. In a general way all olive pickers use the same formula but there is a lwde difference in results. For fifteen years, Miss Enmann has been studying experimenting, developing a method entirely her own which begins with the picking of the olives from the trees and ends with the sorting of the olives by hand before they are packed in air tight tins or bottles.
