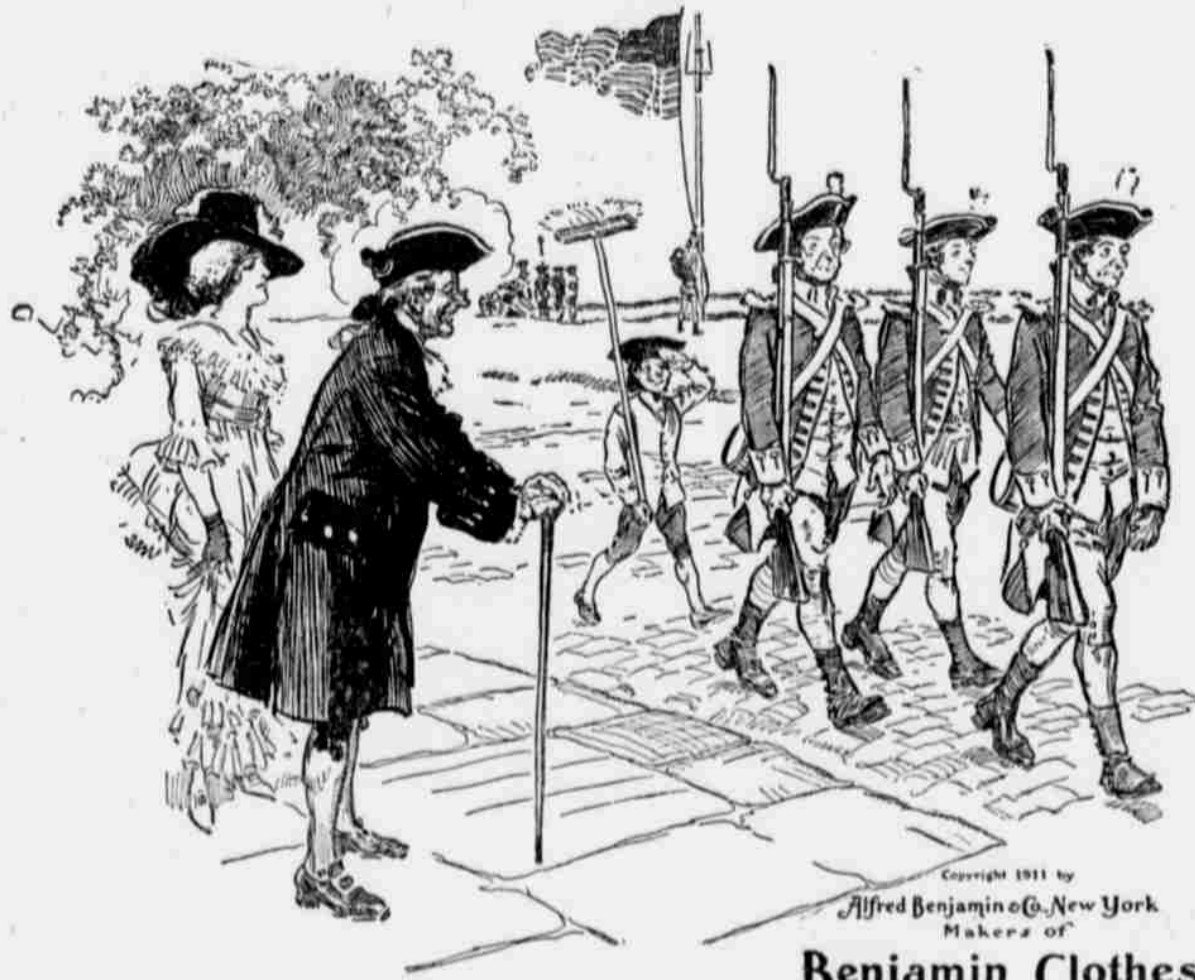

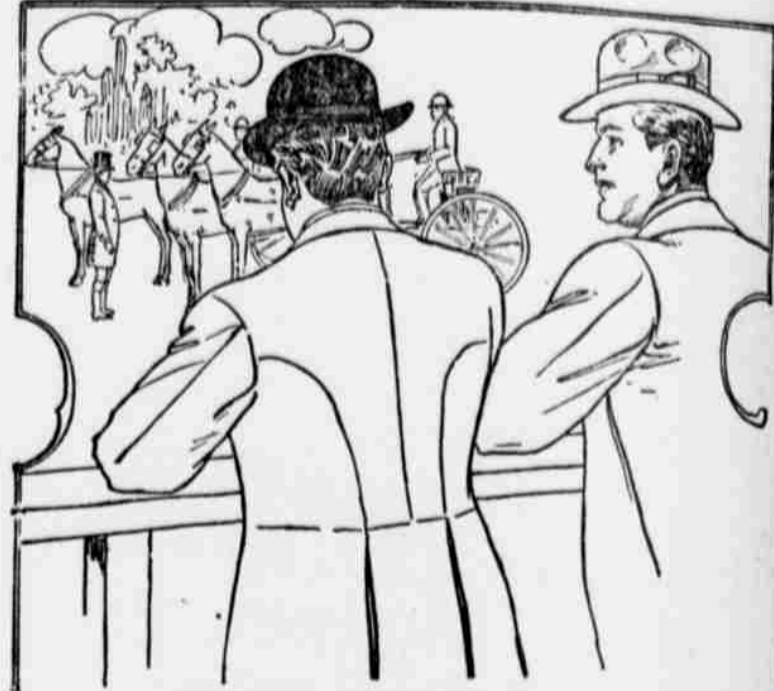

MARSHFIELD, Or., June 26, 1911
To the Public:
In the issue of the Daily Times of June 27, an article appeared over the name of Maude Elliott concerning a certain White Alaska Fox Skin which I have in my possession belonging to her and which I had manufactured into a scarf at her request by H. Liebes & Company, furriers of San Francisco, Cal., this company being one of the largest concerns of this kind in the world and being a responsible and reliable firm.

Miss Elliott charges in the article that I have not had the identical skin manufactured and returned to her. Under the laws of this state I am given a lien upon this fur for the cost and expense of manufacturing it into

the scarf and Miss Elliott not having paid the same I was required after three months to advertise the same and sell it in satisfaction of my lien. Upon return of the manufactured scarf to me, Miss Elliott called at my store in reference to the article, and seemed to be of the opinion that it was not the same skin as delivered to me by her, but I had made a secret identification mark on the skin, as I always do in such matters, and I was able to identify it as the particular skin by this mark; she thereafter directed me to sell the scarf for \$68. I desire to say to the public that the scarf in question was made of the identical skin delivered to me by Miss Elliott and I have in my hands the affidavit of Ben A. Goldsmith, a member of the firm of the furriers mentioned to the effect that it is the same skin. The affidavit being as follows:

SAN FRANCISCO, May 29, 1911.
To Whom it May Concern:
This is to certify that Mr. J. Bryce on November 12th, 1910, delivered to us one (1) white fox skin for Mr. O. O. Lund of Marshfield, Oregon, with instructions to make the same into what is known as an "Animal Striped Scarf."

According to the above instructions, we did manufacture this said skin into scarf, as described, and forwarded the same to O. O. Lund, Marshfield, Oregon, on December 3rd, 1910, and the said scarf was made from the same identical skin that was delivered to us.

I also received a letter from the said company at the same time with the affidavit which is as follows:
SAN FRANCISCO, May 29, 1911
Mr. O. O. Lund,
Marshfield, Oregon.
Dear Sir: We are in receipt of

your favor of the 25th inst., and in reply beg to state that this is the first time in our life that we have ever been called upon to make a sworn affidavit to the effect that a skin that we manufactured into a scarf for anyone, was anything else but the same skin.

According to our order book, we agreed to make this skin into a straight animal scarf, and inasmuch as the skin had no nails in its claws, our order calls for the same to be put in, which we no doubt did, and probably the fact that the skin has nails in the claws now, leads your customer to think it had been changed. This was only done to improve the skin in the way of manufacture.

The scarf is advertised to be sold on July 1st, 1911 at 10 o'clock A. M. at my store to satisfy the lien and expenses of the sale, and same will be sold at that time.
