POPULATION OF NEW YORK.

It Will Outstrip London Within Five or Six Years.
NEW YORK, June 28.—New York will overtake London in the matter of population some time between 1914 and 1916, according to a calculation made public recently by the secretary of the federation of churches. The computations, however, include a portion of the New Jersey suburban territory as a logical part of New York City, making New York's present population about 6,500,000. The difference figured on this basis is now only about 600,000 and the population here is growing at three times the rate of the older city.
