GIRL WITNESS PUT ON STAND

Telephone Operator In Hines' Chicago Office Testifies.

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 1. — Miss Frances Carroll, telephone operator in the office of the Edward Hines Lumber Company at Chicago, and Fred Carney of the Carney Lumber Company, Marinette, Wis., were the leading witnesses today before the Lorimer investigation committee.

Both corroborated portions of Hines and persons in Springfield on the day Lorimer was elected. She repeated the conversation substantially as Hines had done, but on cross-examination she was unable to repeat or recall the date or substance of any other long distance conversation.

She has been in Hines' employ for ten years.

SPOKANE DEAD BROUGHT BACK

Rescued Passengers Also Arrive In Seattle on "Sampson."

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)

SEATTLE, Wash., July 1. — The steamship Admiral Sampson arrived from the north today bringing the bodies of Mrs. Gardner F. Williams of Washington, D. C., and Oakland, Cal., and Mrs. J. E. Strauss of Philadelphia, who died of fright when the steamer Spokane was wrecked Thursday night.

The surviving passengers of the Spokane also returned on the Admiral Sampson.

Mrs. Gardner F. Williams was found drowned in the ladies' toilet room. Apparently she had fainted, and was unable to escape. Mrs. Strauss died of heart failure after the Spokane struck.

Shipping men here believe the Spokane is a total loss. The vessel was valued at \$400,000.

POLICE MAKE WIERD FIND

Bones of Human Being Found Wrapped In Old Newspaper.

PUEBLO, Colo., July 1.—What is believed to be the result of an atrocious murder was revealed in the finding of the complete skeleton of a man in the closet of a cheap lodging house here. The bones were wrapped in a newspaper dated January 1, 1911. Investigation showed the flesh was destroyed by use of quick lime. The police believe the remains were brought here following a crime committed elsewhere.

WEYMAN WINS WORLD TROPHY

American Aviator Wins Back Cup Captured by Englishman.

EAST CHURCH, Eng., July 1. — Charles T. Weymann, American, won the International Aviation Cup today, covering 93.2 miles in one hour, 11 minutes, 36 1/2 seconds. This brings to America the cup won by Claude Graham White, Englishman, at Belmont Park a year ago.

BABES STARVE; RESULT STRIKE

Hull, England, Is Without Flour—Anarchy Almost Holds Sway.

HULL, England, July 1.—Hunger is seriously aggravating the seamen's strike situation here and the piteous appeals of women and children for food would have precipitated something akin to anarchy before now but for the masses of police who have come here from London and other cities.

Flour is so scarce that the price has jumped beyond the reach of the poor.

All of the Hull flour mills are closed.

Twenty-six grain steamers are due within the next few days but they have no means of discharging their cargoes as railway and dock traffic is paralyzed.

RAIN PLENTY FOR GOOD CROP

Farmers Rejoice Over Prospects—Rainfall Less This Year.

With the farmers throughout most the entire remainder of state beseeching Jupe Pluie to send them a little more moisture, Coos county tillers of the soil smiling their broadest and making preparations for the harvesting a banner crop in every variety produce.

According to the official figures for the rainfall for the last months given out by Mrs. E. Mings, special government meteorological observer here, the rainfall this year is 5.26 inches less than it has been for the same period for the last ten years.

The average rainfall up to July 1910, for the 10 years preceding the date was 66.69 inches. The record for this year, from January 1st June 30, shows a precipitation only 61.43 inches. The fall this is said by farmers to have been ty and, while more rain will hurt anything, it is not needed.
