**BISHOP SCADDING PRODS EMOTIONAL REVIVALS**

Opening the International Clericus at Vancouver, B. C. recently, Rt. Rev. Charles Scadding, D. D., bishop of Oregon, made the following remarks: "I know rural Oregon west of the Cascade range pretty thoroughly. It is the fairest field with the finest climate the Creator has given to man. But man is gregarious, and he cannot live on climate, and Newtown apples and hops. The church has a paramount duty to serve these rural districts. She can uplift and cheer, and make people happy and sociable. We must send to our brothers and sisters in the country the finest type of minister that can be had; Godly, earnest, constructive, broad-minded, warm-hearted pastors. Mere occasional services will not suffice, and the periodical revival of an emotional character which draws crowds by maligning local officials, and makes voting the prohibition ticket synonymous with salvation, does more harm than good. We must send into the country districts our best men, and supplement their salaries until these places can become self-supporting."

**DATA FOR OREGON OWNERS OF AUTOS.**

ALEM, Ore., July 4. — For the benefit of owners of automobiles and other power vehicles used and operated in Oregon, Secretary of State Ben W. Olcott has compiled information of value, showing briefly the requirements of the state laws regarding the running of such machines as given in the following:

Any one not having a State license and desiring to operate his car must secure a license under the old law, the fee being \$5. This certificate holds good until July 31, 1911, when it will be necessary to secure a number under the new law. The fee under this new law is based on the horsepower of the vehicle, according to the formula adopted by the Association of Licensed Automobile Managers (A. L. A. M. Rating), found by squaring the bore of the cylinders, times the number of cylinders, and dividing by 2 1/2.

Electric vehicles for pleasure, \$3; electric service vehicle, \$5; steam, gasoline and other motor vehicles operated while a operator for whatever use up to 20-horsepower, \$5; same in excess of 20 and up to 40-horsepower, \$5; 36 to 40, \$7.50; over 40-horsepower, \$10.

The registration fee must accompany application. Under the new law all registrations of motor vehicles expire on December 31 of each year and must be renewed annually. The steam vehicles are based on the horsepower according to Haskell's formula.

Those applying after June 1, 1911, will be issued new numbers under the new law. This law is effective August 1, 1911, but application can be made 60 days prior to that time. The new number tags are 4 by 13, and two tags are required, one for the front and one for the rear of the vehicle. Owing to the complications it would cause, no numbers will be reserved but same will be filed numerically from No. 1 up, and according to the date received.

Chauffeurs or owners operating cars for hire are required to secure a state badge before being allowed to operate. The Secretary of State has on hand about 9,000 pamphlet copies of the motor vehicle law containing the laws of the road and will be pleased to furnish a copy on request. The automobile department of the Secretary of State's office has grown rapidly within the last two years and up to date 6,400 licenses has been issued.

**OWENS IS FOR SHORT BALLOT**

**Oklahoma Senator Advocates Commission Form of Government.**

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 1.—The commission form of government for municipalities was advocated by Senator Owen of Oklahoma this week in a speech before the Senate. The speaker took the position that such a form of government would be an agency for the restoration of integrity and efficiency and the termination of corruption in city, state, and nation, and the overthrow of the undue influence of commercialism in government.

Having declared that the great problem of the present time is the restoration of equality of opportunity so that every man, woman, and child shall enjoy a fair return for labor honorably and faithfully performed, the speaker considered the question in its bearing on the integrity of government.

"The commission form of government," said the senator, "has a national value and a direct bearing upon the integrity of the election of senators because it is an important agency in overthrowing corrupt machine politics in municipalities and cities. The proportion of inhabitants living in cities as compared to the inhabitants of the United States is between 40 and 50 per cent, not counting towns of less than 2,500 inhabitants. If corrupt government can be terminated in cities, it cannot survive in the states or in the nation."

The senator said the commission form of government eliminates more partisan politics in cities, towns and villages in the government of such municipalities. It usually carries with it, he said, the initiative, referendum and recall, giving a home government, a popular government. "It enables the people, through the initiative, referendum and recall," said the speaker, "to initiate and pass any law they do want, including corrupt practice prevention act and veto any law they do not want, such as the granting of franchises of value without consideration. It enables them to recall inefficient and dishonest officials."

Senator Owen said more than 200 cities and towns have adopted some form of this improved method of city government within the last two years. He explained that the commission form as usually understood may be illustrated with the system adopted in Des Moines, Iowa.

The general plan is that the citizens by primary may nominate candidates for mayor and four commissioners who shall have complete charge of town business, legislative, executive and judicial. Any person can be nominated by a petition signed by twenty-five citizens.

The ten candidates having the highest vote at the primary two weeks later are submitted to the citizens for election and the five candidates having the highest votes at this election, comprise the city council with full power—Legislative, executive and judicial. They manage the business as completely as the board of directors could manage the business of a bank.

**COLLISION KILLS FOUR.**

**Morning Tribune Will Aim to "Correct Existing Evils."**

LOS ANGELES, Cal., July 5. — With prominently displayed commendations from LaFollette, William J. Bryan, Governor Johnson and other leaders in political world thought The Tribune, the first one-cent morning daily in Southern California made its initial appearance here yesterday. The new paper was established by Edwin T. Earle, millionaire owner of the Evening Express following reports that the Morning Herald was to be transformed into an afternoon paper. The appearance of The Tribune therefore gives Los Angeles four morning papers.

In a signed salutatory, Editor Earle says "I have no political ambitions to gratify. Our only aim is to serve humanity. Human rights too long have been neglected in this land. The golden calf has been exalted and property rights have been made more sacred than human rights. The Tribune will strive to correct these evils. We expect to be abused and we expect to be misunderstood, but we will ever continue our fight for righteousness and justice."

**R. R. LAW MAKES MANY SUFFER**

**Suburban Trains Stalled and Thousands Sleep on Beaches.**

LOS ANGELES, Cal., July 5.—Because of the law prohibiting trainmen from working more than sixteen hours, ten thousand Fourth of July holiday-makers slept on the sand at the various beaches here last night. Traffic was stopped at 1:15 a. m. this morning on all suburban lines. Fully half of the marooned throng consisted of women and girls garbed in the flimsiest sea side summer costumes and the cold night breezes off the ocean wrought havoc with their nerves and patience.

At four o'clock this morning extra crews were obtained and cars were rushed to the beaches to bring the weary, shivering and hysterical crowds home.
