MOOSE DISPUTE BETS IN COURT

Ex-Secretary Is Sued For \$1,445 by Lodge Organizer.

PORTLAND, July 6.—The Portland Oregonian says: "The taking of testimony was commenced before Judge Kavanaugh yesterday in the case of Roy B. Hopkins, against W. L. Fulmer, ex-secretary of the Portland Lodge of the Loyal Order of Moose in which the plaintiff is seeking to recover \$1,445.

Fulmer, who was acting as temporary secretary October 13, is said to have appropriated money which came in as dues, on instructions from Supreme Organizer Davis after a controversy developed in the lodge over the handling of the funds by Hopkins. He retained control until the charter closed October 29, and then turned the money over to George N. Davis, a Moose official, and his attorney in the case.

UNION MEN UNDER SUSPICION.

Authorities Search For Man Missing Since Crime.

CALEXICO, Cal., July 6.—The two children of W. H. Overman, a rancher, May, aged 14, and a younger brother were slain during their father's absence. They had been shot.

The authorities are searching for W. H. Wolfe, aged thirty, who was left at the ranch when the father came here on business. Wolfe is supposed to be making his way to San Diego where he had \$2,000 on deposit at a bank.

The motive for the crime is unknown.

Reciprocity Spoken of as "Ultimate Destiny" by Burton.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 6.—Senator Burton made a notable speech in the Senate today on behalf of Canadian reciprocity.

He declared reciprocity was "the ultimate destiny of Canada and the United States; that all natural conditions were opposed to maintenance of border warfare in commercial matters; and that farmers in the United States would not suffer injury from the enactment of the Canadian agreement."
