MARSDEN IS BOUND OVER

Justice of the Peace Pennock Holds Accused in \$5,000 Bonds.

City Marshal Jack W. Carter today took Jack Marsden, who was bound over to the Grand Jury on a charge of assault with intent to kill by Justice of the Peace Pennock yesterday, over to Coquille and turned him over to the custody of the sheriff. Marsden's bail was set at \$5,000 and, unable to raise that amount, he will have to remain in the county jail until further action is taken on his part at the September term of court. Marsden was arrested last Monday following an alleged attempt to kill J. W. Bennett, an attorney with whom he had differences, in the latter's office in the Flanagan & Bennett bank building. The accused man was given a preliminary hearing here yesterday before Justice of the Peace Pennock. He was represented by Attorney Charles I. Reigard while Deputy Prosecuting Attorney L. A. Liljeqvist represented the state.

The principal witnesses called by the prosecution were J. W. Bennett and Tom T. Bennett, the former's son and law-partner who was also in the office when the gun play is alleged to have taken place. The testimony of both men was identical.

"About two o'clock last Monday afternoon," said T. T. Bennett, "I was standing on the steps of the Flanagan & Bennett Bank building. My father, who was in conversation with Mr. Flanagan, was a step or two away from me. Just as he concluded speaking, John Marsden walked up and, after intimating that he wished to talk with my father, walked up the stairs of the building with him. I fell in behind them and followed them into the room occupied by J. W. Bennett as his office. My father then asked me to take Marsden into my own office and I did so. When the three of us were together in my room, Marsden brought up the subject of a law suit he recently brought against his father whose side of the case we handled in court. J. W. Bennett told him that he did not care to talk about that matter whereupon Marsden, who was sitting a short distance to my right, reached his right hand back to his hip pocket and a few seconds later, while uttering the words, 'I'll get you,' or something to that effect, drew a revolver.

"Before he had time to raise the weapon to aim, and about when it was on a line with my father's foot I grabbed his right wrist with my left hand and the gun with my right and struggled with him for the possession of it."

As soon as his father had recovered his composure, he continued, he too helped to subdue Marsden as did several other people who had come into the office attracted by the cries for help of a girl stenographer.

J. H. Flanagan and several other witnesses testified to having assisted in the subjection of Marsden until the arrival of the officers and Marshal Carter and Special Officer Walter M. Richardson, told of having gone to the scene of the fracas and of having placed the man under arrest.

Arthur McKeown, a real estate man and a son in law of the elder Bennett, told the court that several weeks ago, during a conversation between him and Marsden, the latter in speaking of Bennett, had threatened to "get that . . . and the rest of them good and plenty."

Even after he was placed under arrest, according to witnesses, Marsden repeated the threat.

The defense entered a plea of "not guilty" and declined to offer any testimony at this time.

The people of North Bend are not

pleased that John Marsden should be called a resident of that city. They state that he has not been in business there for two years, has not received his mail there for the same period and cannot be justly called a citizen or resident of North Bend. The Times had no desire to cast any aspersions on a sister city, but the story was written by a new reporter as it developed and was described by witnesses. Mr. Marsden is not a resident of North Bend and they are entitled to an apology.

PLOT RETURN TO MONARCHY

Portuguese Government Sends Soldiers to Spanish Frontier.

TUY, Spain, July 6.—It was learned here today that the Portuguese government has despatched several thousand troops to the northern frontier, following the discovery of a plot to restore the monarchy. The conspiracy is said to have originated among certain officers of the Portuguese army at Valenua Domingo, just across the border from Tuy.

CONTROL OF CORPORATIONS

Trade Commission Similar to Interstate Commission Is Proposed.

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 6.—An Interstate Trade Commission of five members to control industrial corporations as the Interstate Commerce Commission controls railroads, was advocated in a bill introduced today by Senator Newlands of Nevada.

Newlands in a statement accompanying the measure contended that the Standard Oil and Tobacco decision and the recent government report on the steel controversy, demonstrate the need of "an independent quasi-judicial and administrative tribunal of great character and dignity, as far removed from political control as are the courts."

This would apply to industrial corporations engaged in interstate trade whose annual receipts exceed five million dollars, and such corporations would be known as "United States registered" companies. It proposes to make lack of such registration an indication of "something wrong." The Newlands' plan proposes that frequent reports will be required from corporations informing the public of its character, to be published from time to time.
