INVESTIGATE THE ARREST

"Third Degree" Committee Will Look Into "Kidnapping."

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 7.—The manner of the arrest of the McNamara brothers and others in connection of the destruction of the Los Angeles Times' building will form a subject of representations to the Senate "third degree" committee tomorrow. The speakers will be President Gompers and other officers of the American Federation of Labor and it is understood that they will urge a legislation preventing the so-called "kidnapping" methods in extradition of suspected persons.

WICKERSHAM ON THE LAW

Gives Unqualified Endorsement of Supreme Court Decision.

BATTLE CREEK, Mich., July 7.—Attorney General Wickersham spoke before the Michigan State Bar Association here today and discussed the Supreme Court's interpretation of the Sherman Anti-trust Law and the Standard Oil and Tobacco cases.
