

YESTERDAY'S BASE BALL GAMES

MARSHFIELD LOSES GAME.

The contest at the ball park yesterday afternoon bore a strong resemblance to a free for all frolic on the village green, with all minister's sons barred. Both teams were badly crippled by the loss of many of their best men necessitating the slipping in of a number of circus horses.

Even though the game failed to bear much resemblance to a ball game it was not entirely devoid of interesting features. The work of both twirlers and both captains were splendid. The pitchers both allowed many hits but they redeemed themselves by sloughing down a number of easy ones and making a total of ten strike outs each.

The game went well until the six inning, the score standing 4 to 1 in favor of Marshfield. It was in this frame that the visitors pounced upon Henderson for four hits, coupled with two bases on balls, a fielder's choice and two errors netted the Sumner bunch four runs. In the following spasm the visitors again came through with a vengeance. Barker, the first man up reached first on an error, Masters hit, Du Buque walked, "Shorty" Stevens connected squarely with the pill and took three bags on the swing. Hillstrom who followed biffed out, Fairchilds landed on first on a fielder's choice, Hatson first on an error, Selander walked and Baker connects with the ball for a long drive to center, running in four runs. Two more followed in this inning making a total of six. In the eighth, Sumner scored two more.

Marshfield started off on the fly, one run in the first and two in the second. This gave them a lead until the sixth inning when the bombardment of the visitors commenced in earnest. In the eighth and ninth innings it was thought that the local boys would tie the score as they made three runs in the first mentioned frame and four in the last.

Perhaps the greatest disappointment of the game was the falling down of Neighbors, the Roseburg

crack who recently joined the local squad. The "Kid" came here with a reputation of batting close to 800. This sounded more than good. His fielding record was said to be so close to a thousand that there really wasn't much difference.

In the preliminary skirmish he was worked out on second base. Each and every time he tried to get the ball he would do a Maud Allen stunt, and a few uncouth fans commenced to shout, "Oh you Salome." This compelled Captain Langworthy to take him from the bag and lodge him in the right garden. Here he had no opportunity to show his great field work but at the bat his average fell far short of the coveted 800. Out of five trips to the rubber he succeeded in making one dinky scratch hit. The appellation "dinky" is used advisably as he barely succeeded in beating the hit to the initial sack.

In conclusion a word of praise must be slipped Uncle Herron for his ability with the indicator. The big brush may have their "Bull" Perrins and "Silk" O'Laughlins but when the choice is passed up to the local boys it's big "Jack" Herron every time.
