## IMPORTANT CASE HEARD

Judge Coke Hears Argument In Peddler Law Contest.

Judge Coke yesterday heard the argument in the matter of the State vs. Case, an important case involving the constitutionality of what is known as The Peddler's Law, passed in Oregon in 1909. Laws similar to this have been passed by a number of states and have been held invalid owing to the fact that they undertook to discriminate who might and who might not sell goods manufactured out of the state. The defendant in the case in question was representing the Spaulding Manufacturing Company of Ohio, and acting as traveling salesman for them selling vehicles of different sorts. It will probably be some time before the decision in this case will be handed down as the laws and decisions concerning it are rather involved.

## RAILROAD LOOMS SURE

Telegram Received Here Says "Railroad Is Dead Sure Thing."

"We are just on the eve of the greatest boom that a town or city ever experienced," said a prominent citizen to a representative of The Times today. Continuing, he added, "The boom will not be temporary either. When it gets here, it's here to stay. I have been here a number of years looking for it and according to advices that I have received in the last few days, it is sure enough coming, and soon at that."

It was also learned that there are a number of big capitalists here looking over the railroad situation. A number of the real estate men were seen about it and while they all were extremely taciturn, they would not deny that such is the case.

One real estate man went as far as to say that there were two men here at the present time with close on to half a million dollars to invest in Marshfield property. They are at the present time looking over the field.

It was rumored on the street yesterday that a prominent attorney in town received a telegram from someone who was in a position to know most all of the railroad's workings, that the railroad proposition was "a dead sure thing."

These facts coupled with other developments of the past few days tends to substantiate the statement quoted at the outset of the article.
