as well as war.

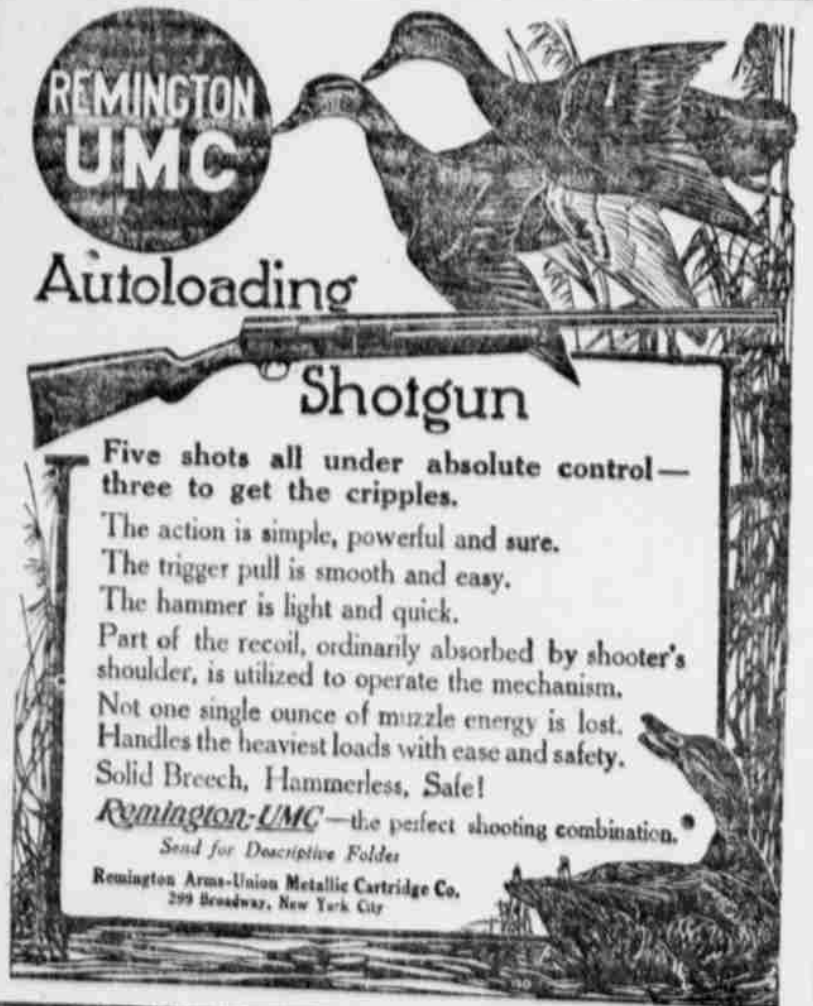
There are many on Coos Bay who

A QUESTION OF DEVELOPMENT

Portland Real Estate Man Ex-
presses Himself On
Coos Bay.

William L. Graham, sales manager
for the Brong-Steele Company, one
of the prominent real estate firms of
Portland, is in Marshfield on a pro-
specting trip for his company. He has
just completed a tour of Eastern Ore-
gon for the same purpose.

This is Mr. Graham's first trip to
Coos Bay and he expresses himself
as pleased with its prospects and sur-
prised at its resources. "It is only a
question of development with you,"
Mr. Graham said to a Times report-
er, "and you can proceed with that
development without a railway. While
a railway would hasten development
think of how much better off you are
than those eastern Oregon towns
with no other means of transporta-
tion than wagons. They have a great
country there but you have a greater
one here. You should work for its
development and the railway will fol-
low. By the way I was greatly im-
pressed by Mr. Tichenor's suggestion
of a "Berry Fair." That would be a
big advertisement for the Coos Bay
country in many quarters. The out-
side world has heard much of Coos
Bay but it has been largely of your
great timber and coal fields. It is
regarded as a place for large invest-
ors. A "Berry Fair" would direct the
attention of small investors to this
section as no other single thing
would and I think it would be a wise
plan for the business men of Coos
Bay to develop such an idea."

Mr. Graham is here investigating
prospective investments and will re-
main until the last of the week. It
was reported that he represented a
special fund that would be placed in
property here but this was denied,
although he said he was looking over
the field with that in view.
