PECULIAR PROCEDURE

Two Injunctions Against City Are Issued In Lapp Case.

That the tax-payers may have some understanding of the peculiar procedure that has been gone through with in the case of Joe L. Lapp vs the City of Marshfield, the attention of a Times' representative was called to them this morning.

Some time ago the Lapp property, on Old Cedar street from the north line of Third street, was to be sold at public auction by the city to pay for the street and various other assessments. It seems that at the time the matter was to come up for sale the city attorney was not in the city, county nor state and would not return for some thirty days. The attorney for the plaintiff, E. L. C. Farrin, who was formerly city attorney at the time that the Lapp property was to be sold at auction the first time, seized the opportunity and got an injunction out against the city and the marshal of the said city, etc.

As the first injunction was only a temporary one, the place was again advertised and was to have been sold last Friday, July 14, 1911. This time the present city attorney, John D. Goss, was not in the state, incidentally the matter has been postponed again, incidentally another injunction has been issued against the city. Just what will be the result of the matter is not known.
