COOS BAY IS FORGING AHEAD

Portland Man Tells His Home Paper of Progress Here.

The following interview appeared in a recent issue of the Portland Telegram:

"W. Wynn Johnson, a Portland real estate dealer, has just returned from a two months' trip through California and southwest Oregon. Mr. Johnson was especially impressed with the splendid progress of the Coos Bay country, where he spent a week on his return, visiting in Myrtle Point, Marshfield, Bandon and Coquille and the surrounding country. "That country is greatly encouraged over the prospect of a railroad being built at an early date, connecting it with the Willamette valley," said Mr. Johnson, "and business is already brightening on the strength of the prospect. The recent transfer of the Pacific & Eastern to a holding company is supposed to be a move by the Hill interests for an opening and recent surveys strengthen the belief that the Harriman interests are planning an early invasion. Options and sales due to this railroad activity are being made every day. "Marshfield has improved wonderfully in the past few years and is now a clean, up-to-date town with considerable paved streets and substantial buildings. It is the center of the dairying industry and I was astonished at the number of motor boats which appeared Saturday loaded with cream. There is room for a far larger number of dairymen in the country.

"Coos Bay is the natural outlet for southwestern Oregon and with railroad facilities should become a large shipping center. The harbor is excellent. The people are all well-to-do and there were no hoboes, beggars or other members of the floating population there."
