ABUSING THE RECALL.

THE TIMES commends to all
friends of the progressive Oregon
System of government the
thought that the Coke recall is a dan-
gerous and disastrous precedent that
should be discouraged.

Whether the parties back of this
movement are strong enough to bring
about a recall is doubtful, but prob-
ably they will try and make a good
bluff at it.

By and by doubtless we will learn
something about this new recall. At
first, like a boy with a new jack-
knife, there is a general inclination to
see how sharp it is. Cut fingers are
inevitable. Later on, as the boy does
when his fingers are nicely bandaged,
we conclude that the recall, like the
knife, is a very good thing, but that
it must be used with discretion.

No official ever will be elected who
is satisfactory to all, and usually it is
the class of citizens who make a lot of
noise, and who believe the world
in general is out of joint, who find
themselves in the minority. The re-
sult is a minority that makes noise
enough for a good healthy majority.
Doubtless it will take some experience
with the recall on the part of citizen-
ship in general to judge the belliger-
ent minority at its true value and
determine when a recall is worth
while and necessary.

What we want is officers who re-
fuse to be bluffed by threats of a re-
call everytime some disgruntled citi-
zen thinks he has a grievance, and
citizens who realize the value of the
recall, but who also realize that it
shouldn't be invoked because of every
petty complaint.—that it's folly to
take a fourteen-inch cannon to
knock robins out of the cherry tree.

WELCOME FIRST ROAD IN

THERE are a number on Coos Bay
who are coming around to the
point of view of the editor of The
Florence West, who in noting the
activity toward building a railroad
into that section, takes this view of
the situation. He says:

"It is asserted by some that Mr.
Wendling is a stockholder in the
Southern Pacific and that the Wil-
lamette Pacific is only a branch of
the other. That part does not make
any difference with our people. The
important part with them is to have
the road built, so that we can have
quick and regular communication
with the markets of the country."

**Dr. Forrest Formerly of Beaver
Hill Has Romantic
Marriage.**

The many friends of Dr. Merle V.
Forrest, who was physician at Beaver
Hill for several months coming
there last September and remaining
until May, will be interested in an
account of his romantic marriage in
Portland, Sunday July 9, when
he and his bride-to-be aroused the
minister out of bed at 7 a. m. to
make them man and wife. Another
interesting feature of the ceremony
was that the minister chosen, Rev.
McPherson, was also a former resi-
dent of Coos Bay, being at one time
in charge of the Methodist Episcopal
church in Marshfield.

The Oregonian prints the follow-
ing account of the affair:
"Romance that began in the sick-
room culminated in marriage when
Dr. Merle V. Forrest, formerly interne
at the Good Samaritan hospital, and
Miss Margaret E. Warnock, a gradu-
ate nurse of the institution, were
united by Rev. Charles T. McPherson,
of the Epworth Methodist Episco-
pal church, at his home, 889 Savier
street. Dr. McPherson was roused
from his sleep by the couple at 7
o'clock and forced hastily to don his
garments and perform the ceremony.
After the wedding Dr. and Mrs. For-
rest left the city on a honeymoon
trip. E. V. Littlefield, a Portland at-
torney, was a witness at the cere-
mony.

Dr. Forrest was interne at Good
Samaritan hospital before he start-
ed practice for himself in a Central
Oregon town. Miss Warnock was
taking the training course at Good
Samaritan, graduating with last
year's class. Friends at the hospital
did not know of the marriage until
some time after it had taken place."
