

COOS COUNTY HARBOR WORK

Maj. Morrow Makes Report Referring to Local Projects.

In an extended report of harbor and river improvements work in this district published in the Oregonian, Maj. Morrow makes the following reference to Coos county projects:

"On the Coquille River, the jetties are in good condition and the entrance channel has been maintained at less than 9 feet at low tide. A snag scow operating near Bandon, by hired labor, has removed 1505 snags at a cost of \$5,271.97. The river is now practically cleared of snags. A new combined snag and drill scow has been completed since last fall at a cost of \$6,661, and is now at work blasting rock on the Coquille river. The scow was constructed at North Bend by Kruse & Banks last fall.

The dredge Oregon began work on June 16 on the Bandon shoal and has removed about 28,504 cubic yards of material. Major Morrow believes that the entire project will be completed by next November, opening navigation as far as 25 miles to Coquille.

Extensive dredging operating was also carried on at Coos Bay up to June 3, when the dredge Oregon was taken to the Coquille project. Twenty-five new pontoons were built to give a longer pipeline and a total of about 418,150 cubic yards of material excavated, giving a channel up the bay as far as the C. A. Smith mill above Marshfield at least 160 feet wide, with a controlling depth of 17 feet at mean low water. Plans are being prepared at Washington for a sea-going hydraulic dredge for service at Coos Bay entrance, which will be ready within a year.

Coos Channel Deepened.
On the Coos River a snag scow and dredge were operated up to last November, removing 228 large and 330 small snags. Twenty-two hundred cubic yards of material were removed from the island shoal on the south fork, and the channel on the north fork was dredged below Allegany for 600 feet. The close of the operations on the Coos River left its channel in excellent condition, giving a total haul of seven miles on the improved portion.

It has been very quiet in San Francisco with a somewhat better condition prevailing in Portland and Los Angeles, but he says there is an undercurrent of optimism that makes the future look brighter and that the upturn is about to arrive.

Mr. Hinsdale says he hears many good words for Coos Bay and thinks that some important developments may be expected but is not risking his reputation as a prophet by stating the exact time of their arrival.
