They are wrong. One of the most valuable lessons a young man can learn is that honesty, square dealing, is not only good morals but good business. It is not only right, it pays.

Permanent success in any line of activity is impossible without public confidence. And one crooked deal, one questionable transaction, will destroy any confidence which may have existed and which it will take years to restore.

The man who is doing business on the principle that the more customers he secures the more money he will make is not only without principle, but is without business sense. He is riding to a fall as sure as the sun is riding to a sunset.

It is as certain as two plus two equal four, and as simple as the law of gravity. But it takes some of us an intolerable time to learn it and often unfortunately the lesson is learned too late.

CONTEMPT CASE CONTINUED.

Gompers and Mitchell File Answers and Criticize Court.  
(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 25.—In lieu of formal answers to the contempt charges against them, Gompers, Mitchell and Morrison of the American Federation of Labor, late today entered oral pleas of not guilty before Justice Wright of the District Supreme Court. They also entered a plea of immunity under statute of limitations and attacked the court for not having instituted the proceedings within the statutory time limit. Further hearing has been postponed for ten days.

**OPENS UP NEW APPLE MARKET**

Reduced Rates Will Permit Oregon Growers to Ship to Canada.

Reduction in the freight rates for moving apples from points in Oregon and Washington to stations on the Canadian Pacific has just been announced, and is expected to result in opening a new and profitable market to the fruit growers of these two states.

The cut varies from 25 cents to 45 cents, according to the destination of the shipments, according to the Oregonian, and is intended to be great enough in every instance to enable Oregon and Washington to compete with Canadian and Eastern products.

E. L. Cardie, general agent of the freight department of the Canadian Pacific in Portland, has just returned from a trip through the fruit growing districts of Oregon and Washington, and has arranged to handle a heavy movement of fruit into Canada in the next few months.

The Canadian Pacific last year moved more than 100 carloads of fruit from the Northwest to points on the main line of that system. Most of this consisted of apples. There is likely to be a greatly increased movement this year.

"The demand for Oregon fruit is as great in Canada as it is in the East," declared Mr. Cardie yesterday. "Little fruit is grown along our line now and many sections that may become fruit producers themselves later on have not developed for enough to market anything this year. More than 200,000 persons settle in the territory served by the Canadian Pacific every year. They are not able to grow fruit enough to supply their own demand and prefer the Oregon and Washington products to any other sent in."

"I believe we shall double the quantity of apples we take out of Oregon this year."

**DEVELOPMENT MAN RETURNS**

J. J. Sayer Completes Prospecting Trip In Coos and Curry Counties.

J. J. Sayer, field representative of the Oregon Development League, left this morning for Gardiner after an extended trip to all the leading towns of Coos and Curry county. He concluded his trip with a successful and enthusiastic meeting at North Bend last night.

Mr. Sayer expressed himself as pleased and surprised at the extent and riches of the resources of these two counties and returns to Portland with much valuable data and information that will be used in promoting the interests of this section of the state.

In a brief talk with a Times' reporter he urged that the county board cooperate with the various towns of the county in a persistent and systematic effort to secure settlers for the undeveloped agricultural lands. There is so much that can be produced here to advantage that Mr. Sayer thinks that in placing all our hopes on timber and coal we are overlooking splendid opportunities in fruit, dairying and other agricultural possibilities.
