DRAIN REVOKES WATER PACT

Trouble With Water Company Culminates In Forfeiture of Franchise.

DRAIN, Ore., July 24.—As the culmination of the trouble between the city council and the water company of this city, at its last meeting the city council revoked the water franchise and declared same forfeited.

The council in its action passed unanimously all being present a series of whereases and resolutions recapitulating the acts in which the water company had "wholly failed, neglected and refused" to comply, and it sounds like a modern declaration of independence, and proceeds to say: "Now, therefore be it resolved by the council of the city of Drain that the franchise, rights and privileges granted to the said C. E. Stewart his heirs and assigns by ordinance No. 12, of the town of Drain, passed by the council of the town of Drain July 19, 1906, be and the same are hereby forfeited, annulled, cancelled and forever held for naught.

"Be it further resolved, that the said Stewart and his assignees the Drain Water company, be and hereby are required to vacate the streets now occupied by them with their pipes, hydrants and meters, and to remove from said streets all said pipes, hydrants and meters within thirty days from this date.

"Be it further resolved that a copy of this resolution be served upon the said company at its office in the city of Drain within ten days from the adoption of this resolution by delivering said copy to its president, manager, agent or other person in charge of its office in the city of Drain.

"Be it further resolved that in case the said company fails or refuses to vacate said streets, and to remove its pipes, hydrants and meters therefrom within thirty days from this date that the mayor of the city of Drain be and hereby is authorized and directed to take the necessary steps and to do and perform the necessary things to have the forfeiture of the said franchise rights and privileges judicially and legally determined and established."

This document in its completed form has been signed by the mayor and attested by the recorder, and the first step taken which will give us better water.

THE "PATSY" IS LAUNCHED

Ocean Going Gasoline Schooner Dedicated to Service This Afternoon.

The gasoline schooner "Patsy," a sister ship of the ill-fated schooner Oskosh, was launched this afternoon at 1:30 on the tide from Kruse & Banks ship-yard at Porter. She is 100 feet long with 24 feet beam and is built for the Elmore Packing Co. of Astoria. Mr. C. H. Deane of that place was present at the launching. Miss Helen Jensen of Crockett, Cal., broke a bottle of wine over the bow as she touched water and christened the new boat "Patsy." The name comes from the initial letters of the ports the schooner will visit—Portland—Astoria—Tillamook—Siuslaw and Yaquina.

After the launching of the Patsy the new boat Tillamook will be taken on her trial trip. Quite a number have been asked to join the trip which will be made to the lower bay.

Miss Jensen, who christened the Patsy is a niece of Mr. K. V. Kruse and is visiting at the Kruse home in North Bend.

A steam schooner is being built at the yards for the Simpson Lumber Company which will be launched about January 1st and while the name has not been definitely announced it will probably be the A. M. Simpson, after the founder of the company.
