erty owners to about \$37 for each 25 foot lot. This of course is much cheaper than the filling could be done in any other way.

Councilman Powers was also authorized to take charge of the bulkheading and repairing of North Front street.

A number of residents of that section were present to voice their indignation but the case was clearly and concisely presented by Councilman Ferguson who also lives in that part of the city. He stated there was no objection to ashes, tin cans, or dry garbage of any kind but the dump had been made a receptacle for butcher shop offal, slops and decaying vegetable matter and all kinds of filth that furnished a breeding ground for flies, rats and vermin that create and distribute disease. The condition of the dump was described as something most foul and a menace to the city health. The matter was referred to Councilman Coke as head of the health committee for immediate action.

Other Business.

Claude Stutsman, engineer of the fire department presented a petition requesting an increase of salary from \$75 to \$90 per month. It was endorsed by Fire Chief Traver giving as a reason that a new engine entailed more work and that Mr. Stutsman's work had saved the city money. After a brief discussion, the increase was granted to commence August 1.

Councilman Ferguson reported that he had secured bids for painting the doors of the fire department in front of city hall as follows:

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AVERAGES OF HOME PLAYERS

Some Statistics That Will Interest Coos Bay Leaguers and Fans.

The Coos Bay baseball league has been playing for five weeks, and North Bend and Marshfield are tied for first place with a percentage of .600, while Eastside and Sumner are tied for third place with a percentage of .400. The average of the players is always interesting to the fans and the following figures are obtained from the available scores of the games. In several instances the scores were not taken and thus it is impossible to figure the totals out for the games that were missed. For Summer 2 games are missed entirely and only the batting averages for this team are at hand for one game of the other three. Two full games are recorded for Sumner. Marshfield has four games available, Eastside five, and North Bend four. The first set of batting averages is for players who have participated in three or more games, followed by others who have played less. Where a player's name does not appear, he has made no batting average. Dell Hennessey leads the league in batting, but is closely followed by Robertson, who has played in two more games. Thomas, the North Bend pitcher, has the cleanest fielding average, having accepted seventeen chances without a bobble. W. Selander, regular for Sumner at first also has a clean score in eleven chances. L. Masters and V. West also have perfect fielding averages. Alfred Matson is actual leader for the fielders, for he has .933 in 15 chances. Young Tellefson of Eastside, has not missed a fly ball this year and had a clean record until Sunday when he allowed a ground ball to pass him.

Wallace leads the catchers in fielding; Selander the first basemen; G. Johnson the second basemen; Burke at short; Briggs at third; Matson center field; Cowan right field; L. Masters left field; Thomas pitcher; Cowan has played three games in left field without having a fielding chance, and therefore is no dope on his fielding.
