

TO REGISTER YOUR RANCH

Farmers in many sections of Oregon are rapidly taking advantage of the law permitting them to register the name of their ranch and secure a certificate of registration. After the name has been registered, the law prevents any one else from using the same. The Times has been urging Coos County farmers to profit by this plan to give the home place a distinctive name.

How to Register Farm Name.
A fee of \$1 is charged for registration, application being made to the county clerk on blanks prepared for the purpose. A description of the farm by section township and range is called for. Before a certificate is issued the secretary of state at Salem, it being his duty to first ascertain that no two farm names are the same, or so near alike as to be confusing.

The law for registering farm names was one of the hobbies of State Senator Hawley, who introduced the bill and piloted it to passage. It was particularly desired by stockmen and fruitraisers, who like to have distinctive names with which to label their livestock or produce, without having the name copied by others.

Linn County Names.
Twenty farm names have been registered in Linn county since the new law went into effect and more applications are being received every week. In Multnomah County.
The first name to be registered in the county was that of Multnomah farm, the new county farm, which was put on record by request of County Judge Cloeton, to secure the county the exclusive use of his name. Others who have certificates on file are J. G. Kelly, "Kelly Homestead farm; Jacob Luscher, "Fairview Holstein farm; Christian Luethe, "Pleasant View Poultry farm;" and H. M. Miller, "Fir Grove farm." Applications are in from Milton O. Nelson for "Hope Gardens," and Charles Cleveland for "Cedar Glen farm." Portland, Gresham, Troutdale, Fairview and Holbrook are represented.
