## COOS BAY'S IDEAL SUMMER DAYS

While Portland Swelters Coos Bayites Wear Light Overcoats.

Evidence continues to multiply that Coos Bay possesses the most ideal climate in the world. Last Monday, when Portland was sweltering in 99 degree heat, Marshfieldite were cool and comfortable at 71. When the mercury rose to a point within seven-tenths of a degree of the 100 mark Monday afternoon at 4:20 o'clock, Portland basked in its hottest temperature since July 30, 1907, when 102 degrees was recorded and that same evening the people on Coos Bay were wearing light overcoats.

Portland was not the hottest place in the United States, says the Oregonian, but it was not far from it, according to the Monday Weather Bureau reports. Phoenix, Ariz., led the list of cities with 102 degrees, and Roseburg and Walla Walla were tied for second place with 100 degrees. Portland came a close third with her 99.3 degrees. New York's maximum was 84 degrees and Chicago 78 degrees. Galveston, Tex., was the coolest place in the United States, a maximum temperature of 58 degrees being recorded and the weather being clear there.

Portlanders should lend a helping hand to that railway project so that they might run down to Coos Bay and enjoy its balmy breezes during such hot spells.

## MAY CHANGE MAIL ROUTE

Bad Condition of Coos Bay Wagon Road May Give Myrtle Point Mail.

C. I. Barnard, mail contractor and manager of the Coos Bay-Roseburg stage line, arrived in the city yesterday on a brief business visit.

Mr. Barnard says if Coos county and the business interests of Marshfield do not bestir themselves in the matter of improving the old Coos Bay wagon road they may lose the mail on that line and receive it via Myrtle Point next winter. He states that all the bad places in the Coos Bay wagon road are just the other side of Summer and that their condition is so bad that it will be impossible to get through when the fall rains begin.

"The U. S. mail inspector told me last winter," Mr. Barnard continued, "that if this stretch of road was not improved this season the mail would again be sent around by the Myrtle Point road and that it would not be changed again. As the postoffice department is insistent on good roads where mail is delivered by stage, I prefer this road but if something is not done I know it will be impossible to get through during the next winter season and if I make this report the route will be immediately changed to the Myrtle Point road and it may be found more difficult to get it changed next time. It seems a pity that such a condition should continue to exist when it would require only about three miles of planking to put this road in really first class condition. Myrtle Point is building a first class road in that section. In fact more work is being done on that road this year than has been done on the Coos Bay wagon road in six years. They are spending probably ten dollars a day filling ruts on the Coos Bay wagon road and the money is absolutely wasted."

Mr. Barnard has expressed his willingness to contribute \$200 per mile personally if the county would put in a plank roadway on the bad spots on this road.

Mr. Barnard was accompanied by his family whom he is taking to Bandon for an outing. He will return to this city in a day or two.

The Times suggests that the Chamber of Commerce appoint a committee to confer with Mr. Barnard on his return as the situation is one that warrants prompt action.
