Bar Dredge Named.—The new bar going dredge for Coos Bay is to be called the Colonel P. S. Michie. Advertising for bids was begun Wednesday and tenders will be opened in about 30 days from now. Bids are also being called for from builders on the Atlantic coast and if it is found that the dredge can be built there and towed around cheaper than on this coast, the work will go to an eastern firm. The dredge will have a 26-inch centrifugal pump. The sum of \$350,000 was appropriated for the work.

A Clam Story.—C. G. Hockett, secretary of the Southern Oregon company, who was in Marshfield on business, yesterday brought with him a few small Empire clams which by actual net weight only weigh 2 1/2 pounds each. TODAY IS BERRY DAY IN COOS CO.

Are You Observing It As a Patriotic Citizen by Eating Berries?

Today is berry day! Are you doing your duty to Coos county and to the berries? Every man, woman and child should eat at least one dish of some variety of berries today. Coos county grows the finest berries and largest variety of any similar section in the world. Appreciation of this condition should result in developing this industry. We should eat berries, think berries and talk berries until Coos county becomes as famous for its berries as Hood River for apples.

It is doubtful if all the residents of Coos county appreciate their good fortune in being located where luscious and delicious berries are so plentiful. Just read this press dispatch from Seattle and be thankful:

"Seattle, July 21.—A special from Fairbanks, says:

"For two weeks some in Fairbanks have been enjoying home-grown berries, the first selling at \$2 a box of 16 berries, but the price has now dropped to \$1.50 a box. The berries are grown by John Sharie, a local gardener who has spent \$10,000 in importing plants at different times and in his attempts to acclimate the vines.

Each year he has sustained a heavy loss through the freezing up and drying out of the vines during the winter season."
