SUMMER ADVERTISING.

E. Brandenberger, advertising manager of the Belleville (Ill.) News Democrat, in discussing "Hot Weather Advertising" in a recent issue of that paper, says:
You need the best weapons when the campaign is the most strenuous. No general would think of partly or entirely disarming his troops just before the biggest battle is to be fought.

These same principles apply also to a business house. Some merchants, in order to curtail expenses during the dull season of the year, begin by cutting down their advertising expenses.

The newspaper is at all times your weapon and best medium of publicity, and when times are dull and competition the keenest, your advertising appropriation ought to be increased to meet these conditions.

FORGET IT.

If you detest this vale of tears, forget it! If you've a whine for victims' ears, forget it; the folks who toddle to and fro and do their duties as they go don't care about your tale of woe—forget it. You think your mission is to teach? Forget it. You'd like a chance to make a speech? Forget it? Too many men like you have sinned by giving us less work than wind; if you to noise your faith have pinned, forget it. You say the laws are all unjust? Forget it. They grind the poor man's face to dust? Forget it.
